The Humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Burgesses of your Majesty's Corporation of Taunton, in the County of Somerset, the sixth day of July, Anno Domini 1683.

Most Dread Sovereign,

**W**E Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, having by your Majesties late Proclamations, with astonishment, received the account of a most horrid and belifful Conspiracy against the Sacred Life of your Majesty, and of your Royal Brother, and in truth, to lay all these your Majesties three Kingdoms in Blood and Ruine, by Gods infinite Mercy wonderfully detected and prevented; contrived by the greatest Pretenders of Loyalty and Religion: and with admiration, calling to our minds the many former Miraculous Deliverances of your Sacred Majesty, of which no Prince, Nation or Person can happily boast the like; so that the whole World must needs know and acknowledge, that your Majesty hath been the choicest and most particular Care, as well as Ordinance of Providence, and that the Almighty is your only Preserver; cannot but from the bottom of our Hearts, and with all our Souls bless God, and humbly congratulate unto your Sacred Majesty and your Royal Brother, and to all your Majesties Loyal Subjects, so great and infinite a Mercy of God, and such repeated Deliverances unto you.

So that long and prosperous yet may be your Reign over us and ours, who shall in all sincerity of heart ever be your Majesties most Faithful and most obedient Subjects.

May it please Your Majesty,

AS we cannot without the greatest Horror and Detestation, observe the Indefatigable Malice and Bloody Treacheries of a Party of Ill Men, who under the pretence of tender Consciences, the only True Protestantism and Evangelical Moderation, have long veild the blackest Treasons and most barbarously cruel and unnatural Resolutions; So it having pleas'd Almighty God, the great Protector of Princes, to discover the Hellish Plots and Murderous Conspiracies, which by their hands so lately threaten'd the Sacred Life of Your most Excellent Majesty, and Your Royal Brother, and consequently the utter Ruine of the Government, as by Law Establish'd, both in Church and State; We, according to our Duty, Congratulate Your Majesties Safety, and wonderful Deliverance, and with grateful Hearts offer up our Thanks to the great God, who by his gracious Providence has so Miraculously preserv'd the Life of Your most Sacred Majesty, and Your dearest Brother, and the general Peace of these Nations, from the rage and malice of Blood-thirsty Rebels and Assassines; Begging of that God that He would grant to Your most Excellent Majesty many and happy Years of Government over us, and that when at last He shall translate You to a Throne of Bliss, Your Imperial Crown may descend only in a Lawful and uninterrupted Succession; And begging that Your Majesty would extend Your Royal Favour so far to us, That being freed from the Encroachments of Faction, we Your most Faithful and Loyal Subjects may be Capacitated, according to our earnest Desires, effectually to lay our Lives and Fortunes at your Majesties Feet.

*Whitehall, July 21.* This day his Grace the Duke of Richmond, Lord High Steward of the County of York, Presented and read the following Address unto His Majesty in the Name of the City of York.

## To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

*The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of Your Majesty's most Ancient and Loyal City of York, in Council assembled,*

DO in all humility crave leave to Congratulate Your Majesties happy Delivery from that Curled Conspiracy lately formed against the Life of Your most Sacred Person and Your Royal Brother; We cannot reflect upon it without Horror and Amazement, blessing Almighty God for the timely Discovery of so Execrable a Treason: And we beseech Him long to continue to us the blessings of Your Gracious Government.

And we do assure Your Majesty, That we are and shall be always ready with our Lives and Fortunes, to protect and defend Your most Sacred Person, Your Heirs and Successors, Your Crown and Dignity, against all Plots and Conspiracies, of what kind, and by what sort of Men soever. And with Hearts full of Loyalty, we humbly pray Your Majesties Reign may be Prosperous, and Your Days many.

In Testimony of this our Unanimous and full Consent; have hereunto affixed our Common Seal.

*Dantzick July 7.* Yesterday the Bishop of Kiow parted hence for Berlin, being sent by the King of Poland, to dispose the Elector of Brandenburg, to enter into the Alliance he has concluded lately with the Emperor. The Letters from Poland say, That the King was suddenly expected at Cracow, and that his Majesty had concluded a Treaty with the Deputies of the Zaporovian Cossacks, who had promised to march with an Army of 40000 Men against the Turks and the Hungarian Rebels.

*Milan, July 7.* The Fleet which is equipped at Cadix; by order of the King of Spain, is very impatiently expected in these Seas, to reinforce the Gallies of Sicily, Sardinia, Naples and Genoa. Our Governor, the Count de Melgar, uses all possible diligence to put the places of this State in a posture of defence. On Friday last he went to visit the Fortress and Garison of Lecco, and was very well satisfied with the good condition in which he found them. Our Letters from Turin say, That the 15th Instant a General Review of the Duke of Savoy's Forces is to be held near that place.

*Vienna, July 11.* Our Letters from Hungary say; That the Ottoman Army is divided into three Bodies, one part of it being encamped at Petronmet, another Party at Altenbourg, and the third before Raab, which they besiege, and have made two attacks upon the place, in which, as is said, they have lost 5000 men. On Thursday last the Count de Starenberg; Governor of this Town; returned hither from the Army, and has given order for the immediate fortifying of this place; and accordingly the Palisados which he has ordered for its Defence, will be finished to morrow. Yesterday the Regiments of Starenberg and Scarfenberg came hither; and two days hence the rest of the Foot and Artillery are expected; having been convoyed into our neighbourhood from the Isle of Schutz, by a strong party of Horse, under the command of General Schultz. Our Cavalry is encamped on a small River near this place, having lately defeated two parties of the Enemies, in which were slain 1500, two Captains made Prisoners, and 200 Horses taken and brought into the Camp. We expect very suddenly four Regiments that are quartered in Bohemia, and 6000 Foot, which the Elector of Bavaria is engaged to send unto the assistance of the Emperor, in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between them. The King of Poland is suddenly expected upon the Frontiers of Hungary, and accordingly the Count de Thurn is parted from hence, to compliment him upon his arrival in these parts. Yesterday the Duke of Lorrain detached a Body of 3000 Horse, to observe the motions of the Enemy. His Imperial Majesty continues with his Court at Melck, a small place upon the Danube, and about twelve leagues distant from hence. Yesterday the Prince of Crov parted from hence for Raab, to put himself into that place, which is open towards the Isle of Schutz. We have taken Prisoner one of the Relations of the Cham of Tartary. The Tartars have in their late Incurfions surprized great numbers of people in their Houses, and such as they cannot carry away with them into slavery; they immediately put to the sword, without distinction of their Age or Sex.

*Lintz July 13.* We have advice from Glad, by two Tartars who were taken Prisoners, That the Magazine of that place was consumed by Lightning, and that the Turkish Army was encamped at Kitzzer, where the Duke of Lorrain held the first Rendezvous of the Emperor's Forces. It is said, That

the loss which General *Caprara* has sustained in the Baggage which was lately taken by the Turks, amounts to 80000 Guilders. That the Duke of *Saxen-Lauenbourg*, lost 10000, and Count *Montecuculi* 30000 Guilders. We have advice from *Pola* by a Courier arrived here, That that King was on his march towards *Hungary*, to joyn the Emperor's Army with 30000 Men.

*Ratisbonne*, July 19. The Imperial Horse are come to *Vienne*, and the Foot are suddenly expected there, where they are to remain until the Forces of the several Princes of the Empire, as well as those from *Poland*, have joyned them. It is said, That the Turks have twice assaulted *Raab*, but were repulled with the loss of 8000 men, and that they have now quitted the Siege. The 13th instant his Imperial Majesty arrived at *Liniz*, and will, as is said, during the War reside either here or at *Salzbougg*. The fifth instant the Emperor commanded the Count *de Caplieres* to bring the *Hungarian* Crown, which was kept at *Presbourg*, to *Vienne*: From whence, on the ninth instant the Emperor's Treasure was conveyed by 25 Hatchiers to *Liniz*. The Count *de Grey*, the French Minister, has upon the application of the Emperor's Commissioner at the Dyet, dispatched a Courier into *France*, to desire that King, in the name of his Imperial Majesty, not to undertake any thing against the Empire, or any of the Members thereof, during the present War with the Turks.

*Hamburg* July 12. We have advice from *Dresden*, That the Count *de Lamberg*, the Emperor's Envoy, was arrived there, intending to soon as he had finished his Negotiation with the Elector of *Saxony*, to return again to *Berlin*. We are told, That that Elector has given out Commissions for the raising of four Regiments of Foot, and two of Horse, besides the Forces which he has already on foot. The 26th past the Landgravine of *Hesse-Cassel*, Mother to the Queen of *Denmark*, died at *Smalcald*, and the Electoral Princess of *Brandenbourg* on the seventh instant at *Berlin*, where the Marquis *de Vitry* late Ambassador from the King of *France*, is arrived from *Poland*.

*Hamburg*, July 16. It is said, That the King of *Denmark* is to have an Interview with his Sister, the Dutchess of *Holstein*, at *Gottorp*, and that the Danish Troops that are at present in our neighbourhood, will suddenly depart from hence, and encamp at *Nehkau*, not far from *Lubeck*. It is said, That the King of *Denmark* intends to return within 15 days to *Copenhagen*. The 8th and 9th instant a General Review was taken of the Danish Horse near *Coldingen*, and the 10th at *Hadesteven*. The Troops of the Duke of *Hanover*, under the Command of General *Podwies*, are encamped near *Nembourg* on the *Wefer*, consisting of 9000 Foot and 4000 Horse and Dragoons. The Troops of the Dukes of *Zell* and *Wolfenbuttel* are likewise on their march towards those parts, and this day the Duke of *Hanover* is expected at *Linsbourg*.

*Strasbourg*, July 16. Ten or eleven Battalions of Foot are expected here from the Camp upon the *Saar*, to finish the Lines of Communication and the Fortifications which the most Christian King has commanded to be made about our Ramparts.

*Verfailles*, July 23. The 16th instant his Majesty parted from *Chalons*, and lodged that night at *Verlus*, the 17th at *Montmirel*, the 18th at *la Ferre*, the 19th at *Lagni*, and the 20th instant his Majesty returned hither, having been met by the Dauphin at *Plaisance*. The 22 instant Signior *Ranucci*, the Pope's Nuncio, had a private Audience of their

Majesties, the Dauphin, and the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*. His Majesty has appointed the Marquis *de Tilladet*, Captain of his *Swiss* Guards, to go into *England*, in quality of his Envoy extraordinary, to Congratulate his Majesty of *Great Britain*, upon the Discovery of the Conspiracy formed against his Person, and his Royal Highness the Duke of *Tork*.

*Paris*, July 28. On Thursday last the Pope's Nuncio had a private Audience of his Majesty, and the first of the next month proposes to make his Publick Entry into this place. The Kings Council meets frequently, and the Prince of *Conde* has been sent for to assist thereat. The Officers of the Army have received orders to repair to their several Companies before the 15th of the next month, upon pain of being deprived of their respective Com-mands.

*Portsmouth*, July 19. The 17th instant in the afternoon, his Grace the Duke of *Grafton* came to an Anchor at *Spithead*, with his Majesty's Ships under his Command.

*Deale*, July 19. This afternoon Vice-Admiral *Herbert* arrived here from the *Streights*, in his Majesty's Ship the *New-Tyger*.

*Whitehall*, July 21. We are Commanded to give Notice, That all Gentlemen that are Officers in His Majesty's Army in *Ireland*, are required to repair forthwith to their respective Quarters in that Kingdom, and there to attend His Majesty's Service, upon Peril of the loss of their several Commands.

*Whitehall*, July 19. This Afternoon Prince *George*, Brother to the King of *Denmark*, arrived here, and was received by their Majesties and their Royal Highnesses, with great Demonstrations of Kindness and Esteem.

*London*, July 21. Yesterday Captain *Thomas Walcott*, *John Rouse*, and *William Bone*, were drawn upon Sledges to *Tyburn*, and there Hanged and Quartered according to the Sentence past upon them the 14th instant at the *Old Bailey*. And this day Sentence of Death was likewise executed upon *William Lord Russel*, by severing his Head from his Body, upon a Scaffold erected for that purpose in *Lincolns-Inn-Fields*.
