

Whitehall, January 17, 1828.

The King has been pleased to give and grant unto Thomas Stott, of the city of Quebec, Esq. sometime Paymaster of the 29th Regiment of Foot, and now Paymaster of the 4th Royal Veteran Battalion, in behalf of his grandson and sole heir expectant, William-Jane-Stott Wilson, an infant, of the age of fourteen years, or thereabouts, His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he the said William-Jane-Stott Wilson, and his issue, may take and use the surname of Stott, in lieu of that of Wilson, and also bear the arms of Stott; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually fired the said gun) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

IN obedience to an order of the Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen, dated the 29th day of January 1828, made in pursuance of an Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, cap. 27, intituled "An Act for raising an additional sum of money for carrying into execution several Acts for widening the entrance into the city of London near Temple-bar, for making a more commodious street or passage at Snow-hill, and for raising, on the credit of the Orphan's Fund, certain sums of money for those purposes, and also for enlarging the powers of the said Acts;" and of a certain other Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fifty-second year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for increasing the fund for watching, lighting, cleansing, watering, and repairing Blackfriars-bridge;" I do hereby give notice, that between the hours of ten in the forenoon and two in the afternoon, on the 29th day of July next ensuing, at my Office of Chamberlain of the City of London, in Guildhall, London, the principal sums of money, together with all interest due on the said 29th day of July next ensuing, upon the under-mentioned bonds, being part of the sum of £100,000, raised by the authority of the aforesaid Act of the forty-fourth of George the Third, under the common seal of this city, and made payable to Richard Clark, Esq. his executors, administrators, or assigns (by indorsement), will then be paid off, at my said Office at Guildhall, to the several and respective person or persons respectively entitled to receive the same; and that from thenceforth the interest on the said bonds will cease and determine.
