His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felonies above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the persons who actually maimed and slaughtered the sheep) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Exchequer Bill-Office, March 4, 1828

THE Exchequer Bills dated in the months of January, February, and March 1827, viz. 58 Geo. 3, cap. 45, for building additional churches; 3 Geo. 4, cap. 86, for carrying on public works and fisheries; 7 Geo. 4, cap. 50, £13,200,000, 1826, with the interest due thereon, will be paid off on the 28th day of March next, when the interest will cease. Such bills will be received daily (holidays excepted), from ten o'clock till one, until and including the 22d day of March, at this Office, where lists are to be obtained, containing instructions for arranging the bills. The bearers must endorse each bill with their usual signatures, and write their names and residences at the bottom of each list; and where the names of holders are inserted in bills, the bearers, not being such holders, must previously obtain their endorsements. The bearers must attend to give receipts for the payment.

Payment may be obtained, if required, previous to the said 28th day of March; upon leaving the bills for examination one day prior to that on which such payment is desired.

New bills, bearing an interest of two pence by the day upon every one hundred pounds, and dated the said 28th day of March, may be obtained in whole or in part payment of principal, upon stating the required amount on the lists, delivered on or before the said 22d day of March, which new bills, with the interest on the bills exchanged, will be issued on the 29th day of March.
