His Lordship, attended by a squadron of dragoons, proceeded to the Castle, and the Council having assembled at three o'clock, was introduced in form to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, who received him sitting under the Canopy of State in the Presence Chamber, from whence a procession was made in the usual state to the Council Chamber; the Council sitting, his Lordship's commission was read, and the oaths being administered to him, his Lordship was invested with the collar of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and received the sword of state from the Lords Justices.

His Excellency afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber, and received the compliments of the Nobility and other persons of distinction upon his safe arrival, and taking upon him the Government of Ireland.
