"For the further guidance of shipping through the Cattegat, the Board has this spring placed a sea mark, somewhat more than half a mile, N. by E. per compass, from the most northerly of the four sea marks which, according to ordinance of 21st of February 1805, are kept on the east coast of Lessüe.

"This adjoined sea mark will, together with the other ones on the coast of Lessoe and on Trindeln, until further, be kept on the spots pointed out on the charts of Cattegat per 1827, issued by the Danish Sea Chart Archive.

"It stands on the north east point of the grounds coming out from the Syrodde (the most easterly nœze of Lessöe), in six fathoms water, one Danish mile, N. E. by compass, from the south easterly sea mark on the Trindeln.

" It consists of a pitched beam, with a large broom at the top, about 15 feet above the surface of the water."
