PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the sixth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the "trade of the British possessions abroad," after reciting, that " by the Law of Navigation foreign " ships are permitted to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the countries to " which they belong, goods, the produce of those " countries, and to export goods from such posses-" sions to be carried to any foreign country what-" ever, and that it is expedient that such permission " should be subject to certain conditions," it is enacted, "that the privileges thereby granted to "foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those " countries which, having colonial possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, shall place the commerce and navigation of this country, and of its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation; unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to "grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled by such foreign country:

And whereas by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the "Customs," after reciting or taking notice of the said Act so passed as aforesaid in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, and after reciting, that unless some period were limited for the fulfilment by foreign countries of the conditions mentioned and referred to

in the said recited Act, the trade and navigation of the United Kingdom and of the British possessions abroad, could not be regulated by fixed and certain rules, but would continue subject to changes dependent upon the laws from time to time made in such foreign countries; it is therefore enacted, that no foreign country shall hereafter be decined to have fulfilled the conditions so prescribed as aforesaid in and by the said Act, as to be entitled to the privileges therein mentioned, unless such foreign country; had in all respects fulfilled those conditions within twelve months next after the passing of the said: Act, that is to say, on or before the fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six; and for the better ascertaining what particular foreign countries are permitted by law to exercise and enjoy the, said privileges, it is further enacted, that no foreign country shall hereafter be deemed to have fulfilled the beforementioned conditions, or to be entitled to the privileges aforesaid, unless and until His Majesty shall by some Order or Orders to be by him made, by the advice of His Privy Council, have declared that such foreign country hath so fulfilled the said conditions, and is entitled to the said privileges; provided always, and it is thereby declared and enacted, that nothing therein contained, extends, or shall be construed to extend, to make void or annul any Order or Orders in Council theretofore issued, under the authority or in pursuance of the said recited Act, or to take away or abridge the powers vested in His Majesty in and by the said Act, or, any of those powers, any thing therein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding:

And whereas the conditions mentioned and referred to in the said Acts of Parliament, have not in all respects been fulfilled by the Government of His Most Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, and therefore the privileges so granted as aforesaid by the Law of Navigation to foreign ships, cannot lawfully be exercised or enjoyed by the ships of Spain, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall

grant the whole or any of such privileges to such Spanish ships:

And whereas His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to grant the privileges aforesaid, in certain cases, to ships of the dominions of His Most Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, His Majesty doth therefore, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority in him vested by the said recited Acts of Parliament, declare and grant, that it shall and may be lawful for Spanish ships to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the colonies and foreign plantations of His Most Catholic Majesty, goods, the produce of those colonies and possessions, and to export goods from such British possessions abroad, to be carried to any foreign country whatever:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable William Huskisson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary, directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the eighteenth of October last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar), will expire on the twenty-third day of this instant May; and whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, and command, that no person or persons whatever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service), do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the twentythird of this instant May), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar) or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammu-nition, on board any ship or vessel, for the transporting of the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties imposed in that behalf by an Act, passed in the sixth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the general "regulation of the Customs:" And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Royal Highness the Lord High Admiral, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And it is thereby provided, that if His Majesty shall deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports, and it is enacted, that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, shall extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such port or ports respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And whereas His Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to the ports of Pictou and Sydney, in the province of Nova Scotia; His Majesty doth therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in him by the said Act of Parliament, and with the advice of His Privy Council, order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the date of this Order, the provisions of the said Act of Parliament respecting free ports shall be, and the same are hereby, extended to the said ports of Pictou and Sydney, in the province of Nova Scotia:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable William Huskisson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following is the copy of an Order in Council, approving of districts being assigned to the chapels at Hale, Garston, Wavertree, and Much Woolton, in the parish of Childwall, in the county of Lancaster:

At the Court at Windsor, the 15th January 1828, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes for all

ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, or for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall upon the consent of the said patron patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduces, or other endowments, which will by such division arise, accrue and remain to be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions, and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided; and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted " that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete separate and distinct parishes aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts, as they with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation to the attending Divine Service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclestastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein; the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proper to be described; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the pur-pose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effec-tual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes: " further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect: and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that the parish of Childwall, in the county of Lancaster, and

Bocese of Chester, contained in the year 1821, when the last census was taken, a population of 6,618 persons, and the same has since considerably increased; that the parish is divided into the following town-ships Childwall, Wavertree, Allerton, Much Woolton, Little Woolton, Garston, Speke, Hale, and Halewood: that the parish church and four chapels are the only consecrated places of worship, and afford accommodation for 2,866 persons: the parish church which is cituated in the township of Childwall, will accommodate 813 persons; a chapel at Wavertree, 683 persons; a chapel at Hale, 530; and a chapel at Garston, 240; and a f- Much Woolton, 600 persons; that your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient for securing a due ecclesiastical superintendance of the parish, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein; that ecclesiastical districts should be assigned to the chapels at Hale, Gaston, Wavertree, and Much Woolton, under the provisions of the 16th section of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty, and that the boundaries of such districts should be as follows: the district annexed to Wavertree chapel is bounded at the south-eastern corner by the Green-lane, leading eastwardly from Roselane towards Eaton-house, and by the Bye-lane leading from the said Green-lane, past the farm-house called Dodlow-hall, to the high-road between Wavertree and Woolfon, it is then bounded by the said high-road between Wavertree and Woolfon, as it in a westerly direction as far as the lane leading from it to the Moss-pits, the boundary line then crosses the said high-road in a northerly direction, and the district is bounded thenceforward by the said Bye-lane, leading to the Moss-pits, till it joins the toad between Wavertree and Childwall, church, it is then bounded by the said road between Wavertree and Childwall, as it runs in a westerly direction as far as the point where it joins the road, between Wavertree and Broad-green, the boundary lime then crosses the said road at their point of intersection, and the district is thenceforward bounded to the south-east by the said road, between Wavertree and Broad-green, as far as the bye-road leading from it to Wavertree-nook, then by the said bye-road as far as the point where it turns to the north-east, and then it is bounded by an imaginary line drawn from that point due north to the boundary of the townships of Wavertree and West-derby, in all other respects the district is bounded by the boundary lines separating the township of Wavertree from those of West-defby, Toxteth-park, Allerton, and Garston; to Garston chapel is assigned the township of Garston, and all that part of Speke which is not included in the portion hereinafter assigned to the chapel of Hale, also all that part of the township of Allerton, which lies to the south-west of the road leading from Wavertree to Allerton-hall-gates, and to the north-west of the road leading from Woolton to Garston; to Hale chapel is assigned all that part of the township of Speke which lies to the south of the road leading from Hale to Woolton and Garston, by Mill-brow to the hamlet of Oglet, and towards the river Mersey, and to the east of an imaginary dine brawn from the point where the said road turns

eastwardly to the river so as to include all the houses. in the hamlet of Oglet; to the Woolton chapel is assigned the township of Much Woolton, excepting that part of it called Gateacre, which lies within 50 yards of the south-side of the road between Gateacre-brow and Gateacre finger-post, and which is included between the said road, and a boundary line running parallel to it at a distance of 50 yards, such line being drawn from the road leading from Gateacre-brow to Woolton, to that leading from Gateacre finger-post to Halewood, excepting also the hamlet of Thingwall, to the same chapel, is also assigned all that part of the township of Little Woolton which lies to the south of the road leading from Gateacre-brow to Folly-vale, all that part of the township of Halewood which is not included in the ancient chapelry of Hale, all that part of the township of Allerton which lies to the south of an imaginary line drawn from the southern side of the road leading from Gateacre-brow to Folly-vale, in a south-westerly direction, to the road leading from Wavertree to Allerton-hall, also all that part of the township of Allerton which lies to the east of the said road leading from Wavertree to Allerton-hall, and to the south of the road leading from the village of Woolton to the village of Garston; that the consent of the Bishop of the diocese to the assigning of such districts has been obtained as required by the 25th section of the Act of the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty: that the said Commissioners beg leave therefore to lay before His Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into his royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as His Majesty in his wisdom shall seem meet. His Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act, Jas. HE following is a copy of an Order in Council, approving of districts being assigned to the new chapels built at Salford and at Camp Field, in the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster:

At the Court at St. James's, the 19th of March 1828, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop

of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent, to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise, accrue, and remain, and he within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of affecting such division; provided always that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted " that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to the persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners, shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and, if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order, of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" And whereas by an Act passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act, to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such division into effect; and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that the parish of Manchester, in the county of Laneaster, contained, in the year 1821, when the last

census was taken, a population of 186,942 persons which had considerably increased since that time, that besides the parish church there are 19 consecrated chapels, which together afford accommodation for about 19,300 persons only: that the said Commissioners have caused to be erected two new chapels in the said parish, one in Salford, and the other in Camp-field, wherein accommodation is provided for 3666 persons, including 2278 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor, that the said chapels have been consecrated, and that Divine Service is regularly performed in them: that it appears to the said Commissioners to be expedient for securing a due ecclesiastical superintendance of the parish, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, that districts should be assigned to each of the said new chapels under the provisions of the said Act passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, and that such districts should be named Saint Philip's District and Saint Matthew's District: that their boundaries should be as follows: the boundary of Saint Philip's District to commence at the westerly side of a certain public bridge over the river Irwell called the New Bailey-bridge, thence proceeding all along and adjoining to the westerly side of the River Irwell up to the New Regent-road which leads from the town of Eccles to the town of Manchester, thence continuing all along the north side of and adjoining to the same road as far as such road lies co-extensive with the township of Salford, thence in a north-easterly direction all along the line which divides the town-ship of Salford from the parish of Eccles, and so continuing until that line joins the river Irwell on the westerly side thereof, thence proceeding in a curved and irregular line along the side of the said river which adjoins the township of Salford, and extending up to a point at which the south side of Perustreet, if produced westerly, would meet the said river, thence proceeding all along the south side of Peru-street so produced, and at the east end thereof, continuing in a southerly, direction along, the west side of a certain ancient road (now laid out as a street, but not yet named, adjoining on the east-side the new market in Salford) thence crossing Chapelstreet at White Cross-bank, and proceeding all along the south-west side of Irwell-street to Stanley-street, thence along the south-east side of Stanley-street up. to the New Bailey-bridge aforesaid, all which district is situated in the township of Salford and of Manchester, and is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan accompanying the said representation: that the boundary of Saint Matthew's district, should commence on the southerly side of Lower Irwell-street at the point where that side of the said street adjoins the river Irwell, thence to proceed along the south side of Lower Irwell-street, crossing Water-street in a south-easterly direction to Charles-street, thence crossing Lower Byrom-street to Camp-street, thence proceeding all along the south side of Camp-street, thence crossing Deans-gate to Alport-town continuing all along the south side of Alport-town and at the termination thereof, continuing all along the west sides of a part of Taylor-street and Watson-street in a northerly direction, thence crossing. Watson-street to Great. Mount-street, continuing all along the south side of Great Mount-street to Lower Moseleystreet, thence proceeding all along the west side of part of Lower Moseley-street to a branch of the Rochdale canal, thence all along the southwest side of that branch of the said canal, thence crossing the said canal to Cambridge-street, thence continuing along the south-west side of a part of Cambridge-street to the river Medlock, thence in an irregular line along the north side of the said river until it falls into the Irwell, thence along the east side of the Irwell up to the point aforesaid, where the Lower Irwell-street joins the river Irwell, all which district is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan accompanying the said representation: that the consent of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese has been obtained as required by the said Act, and humbly praying that His Majesty would be pleased to take the said circumstances into consideration, and to make such order therein as to His Majesty should seem meet. His Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions C. C. Greville. of the said Act.

At the Court at Windsor, the 27th of February 1828, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues

- 2. But in the case of a Prisoner, whom his Creditors have removed, by an order of the Court, from a gaol in or near London for hearing in the country, such notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.
- 3.
