been Pardoned, either for acting immediately in it themselves, or siding with those that did Murder Your Father (of Blessed Memory) whereby it appears they have made Shipwreck, not only of all Religion, but even Morality itself, and are proof against all Obligations and Mercy.

What advantage have they given to the Enemies of the Protestant Religion to triumph? A Reproach they are not only to Christianity, but even to Humanity. Most Gracious Sovereign,

ALthough this your Majesties Corporation may be counted one of the meanest Tribes that have this second time Addressed your Majesties Throne, yet our Loyalty to your Majesties Sacred Person and Royal Government, and our humble Gratitude for all the precious Fruits of it, are of the same extent and sincerity with all those numerous Corporations that have took Precedency of us only in their Recognitions to your Majesty.

We cheerfully tread in the same venerable steps of their Allegiance, and with equal and unshaken Allegiance we detest all Covenants and Associations of whatsoever Quality or Original (whether that which was called the Solema League, or that more Puny one proved to be found in my Lord Shaftsbury's Closter) that may in the least Infringe upon the Blessed Establishment of your Majesties Crown in its Lineal Succession, and that Excellent Religion that now Flourishes under its Royal Shadow and Protection, in the defence of both which we shall heartily joyn, as 'tis our bounden Duty, with all your Majesties Liege Subjects, to the utmost Effusion of our Blood and Treasure.

In the mean while whenever it shall be your Majesties pleasure to Summon a Parliament, we Unanimously resolve to use our utmost endeavours to choose such as shall be not only Representatives of this your Majesties Borough but of this our avow'd Allegiance, Praying always that the Almighty would preserve your Majesties Person, Crown and Dignity, against the Rabbekas of our Church and State.

Ratisbonne, July 29 The 26. instant the Count de Crecy the French Minister, presented a Memorial to the Diet, wherein he acquaints them, That the King his Master would not take advantage of the condition the Emperor is at present in by the War with the Turks; and therefore does offer to make a Truce with his Imperial Majesty and the Empire for 30 years, upon condition they do consent to it before the end of the next Month. The Bishop of Aichstadt has sent an Express to inform the Emperor of this Proposition, and is expecting his orders upon it. In the mean time the Debates concerning the point of the publick security and the lending a speedy assistance to the Emperor, have been renewed; But the Electoral Colledge persists in their former conclusion, That it is absolutely necessary to establish a firm Peace with the Crown

of I raise upon the Conditions proposed, and that that being done, they shall be better able to assist the Emperor against the Turks. There are Letters from Passaw, which say, That the Duke of Lorraine having notice of a Convoy that was coming to the Turkish Camp before Vienna, sent out a strong Party, who meeting with the said Convoy, defeated the Turks, killing 600 of them upon place, and took 1000 Wagons laden with Ammunition and Provisions.

Nuremberg, August 2. In a Conference held at Hasford the 27. past between the Bishops of Bamberg and Wirtsbourg, and the Deputies of the Elector of Brandenburg, the Princes Hanspach, Bareith, &c. It was resolved that the Troops of Franconia designed for the assistance of the Emperor, should begin their march as this day. The Bishop and Chapter of Wirtsbourg lend two Regiments of Foot and 4 Companies of Dragoons; And the Elector of Brandenburg, besides his Quora, will assist the Emperor with a Body of Men under the Command of the Velt Marshal Dorfling; And a 41000 men of the Elector of Bavaria's Troops are said to be already on their march, to joyn the Duke of Lorraine, who continues encamped at Krembs on the Danube, expecting the coming up of these Auxillary Troops.

Francfort, August 4. The last Letters we had from the Imperial Army gave an account, That the Turks had raised several Batteries against Vienna, which were chiefly managed by Renegadoes of all Nations; That they had made three attacks near the Scotenburg Gate and the Red Tower, and that they were as often repul'd with the loss of about 8000 Men; That the Grand Visier had thereupon demanded a Cessation to bury his dead, but that the Count de Staremberg, Governor of the place, had answered, That he had no need of a Truce, his Garrison being all very well; That the besieged had made several sallies, and that in the last they had regained the Suburb called Leopoldstadt; That they had with their Cannon ruined most of the Turks Batteries, and particularly that which they had raised before the Scotch Gate; That there were 18000 fighting men in the place, with Ammunition and Provisions for several months; That the Governor had taken several considerable sums of money out of the Religious Houses, with a promise to repay them, which he intended to employ in paying and encouraging the Souldiers; That he had caused an exact account to be made of the provisions that are in the Magazines, which he sees himself distributed among the Souldier, as likewise the Scholars and young Burghers who mount the Guard; And that these have all taken an Oath to defend the place to the last, and never to hearken to any Proposals from the Enemy, how advantageous soever they may be.

Cologne, August 4. From Passaw they write that the Duke of Lorraine had received Letters from the Governor of Vienna, dated the 16th past, by a Fisherman who swam over the River, wherein he tells him that the place was in a good Condition, and that he doubted not but to defend it for some time. The Disorders here are very great: Yesterday the Garrison mu'ned for want of their Pay, whereupon the Burghers put themselves into Arms, and before they laid them down, several Persons were killed and wounded.

Hague, August 10. The Men of War that were in the Texel are sailed to the Rendezvous on the Coast of Zealand. The States General have written to the Magistrates of Cologne, to exhort them to accommodate in this dangerous Conjunction, the differences depending between them and the Burghers.

Marseilles Aug. 6. The 3d instant arrived at Thoulon a Tartane from Argiers, with Letters from Mons. du Quesne, which were immediately sent forward by an Express to Paris. The News this Tartane brings, is, That there has been a great Commotion at Argiers, that the Soldiers had murdered, and cut off their General Babba Hassan, as likewise his Nephew, and three or four of his Principal Friends, and that they were resolved to hazard all, rather than submit to Monsieur du Quesnes demands, (who among other things, insisted to have twelve thousand Dollars paid for Damages, and that the Cannon taken by the Algerines at Giggery, should be restored.) That thereupon Monsieur du Quesne had again made use of his Bombes, and done great Execution with them; That he had caused the Gallies to row the Ships within Musket Shot of the Mould; that under the favour of their Cannon, the French had landed, and that they were Masters of the Mould for two or three hours, but then were forced to retire again with the loss of two or three Captains, and several Persons of Quality; and that Monsieur du Quesne continued to batter the Town with his Cannon and Bombes. It is what's reported here, whereof we may inform you with more certainty by our next.

Paris, August 14. By a Tartane which parted from Argiers, the 22 past, we have advice, that the Militia had murdered, and had cut off Babba Hassan, with the chief of his Party; that things were in great Disorder and Confusion at Argiers; and that Monsieur du Quesne was expecting the Resolution of the Divan, concerning the Propositions of Peace which he had made to them. The Count de Crecy, our Kings Minister at Ratisbonne, has by a Memorial, which he gave in the 26. past, acquainted the States of the Empire assembled there, that his most Christian Majesty, in consideration of the State which the Empire is now reduced to, through the War with the Turks, is willing to consent to a Truce for Thirty years, upon condition the Emperor and the Empire do accept of the same before the end of this month of August.

Norwich, August 4. This week arrived here the Right Honourable the Earl of Arundel, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Norfolk, and of this City and County; The High Sheriff, and the Mayor, and Aldermen of this City, with the principal Gentry, met his Lordship about two Miles from hence, and conducted him hither, being followed by about 2000 Horses, and near 100 Coaches, and here his Lordship was received with all publick expressions of Respect and Esteem.
