

Men, with most of their Baggage, Ammunition, and Provisions, having taken One thousand Wagons: The Enemy being retired, the Duke of Lorraine reinforced the Garrison in Presbourg; and caused all the Boats which Count Teckelely had got together to make a Bridge over the Danube to be burnt. The City of Vienna continues to make a very brave defence; and we are told that a Country-fellow being sent with Letters from the Duke Lorraine to Count Starenberg, not only got well into the place, but is come back again, and reports, That the Belieged are full of courage, and want nothing, and that the Turks make their attacks with less vigor than they did at first; and from other hands we have an account, That the Turks begin to want Provisions and other Necessaries, and that their Army is much weakened. Major General Dunewald is abroad with 10000 Horse to observe the Enemy.

Lintz, Aug. 7. The news we had of the Duke of Lorraine's having obliged Count Teckelely (who had a design upon Presbourg, and had provided a great many Boats there to make a Bridge over the Danube) to retire with the loss of 3 or 600 Men, and his Baggage and Provisions, is confirmed from several places. The Duke of Lorraine, as we hear, is Encamped on the River Marck, about two Miles from Presbourg, to observe Count Teckelely, and to hinder his passing into Moravia, and Count Leslie is abroad with 3 or 4000 Men. We are assured that the Turks suffer very much for want of Provisions, and through the Distempers that reign in the Camp.

Munick, August 4. We expect here this evening the Elector of Bavaria in his return from Passlaw. We are told that his Electoral Highness has resolved to raise nine new Regiments of Foot, and that the Clergy of this Country have promised to contribute to the charge of it. The Marriage between his Electoral Highness and the Archduchess, the Emperor's Daughter, is said to be concluded.

Passlaw, August 8. The last account we have concerning the Siege of Vienna, is, That the place is in a very good condition, That the Turks suffer very much in their Camp, and for that reason push on the Siege with all the vigor they can, but that they meet with so brave a resistance on the part of the besieged, as not to make any great Progress in it. The Duke of Lorraine has had a rencounter with Count Teckelely, cut off his Rear, and taken his Baggage and Provisions, and besides secured Presbourg, which was in danger of falling into his hands. The Troops of the Elector, and the Circle of Bavaria are arrived at Krems, where they expect the orders of the Duke of Lorraine, in order to their joining the Imperial Army; we are assured that the King of Poland is on his March.

Ratisbonne, August 12. This Morning arrived here the Prince of Anspach, and the Count de Hohenloe; and the Prince of Bareith, and Prince Waldecke, are expected here to morrow with 800 Horse of the Circle of Franconia, and 3000 Foot will follow the day following. On Sunday last passed by this place the Regiment of Leslie consisting of 1000 men, and the Regiment of Neuburg; and the rest of the Troops of Franconia, and 5000 men of the Circle of Suabia will suddenly follow. From Passlaw we have advice that Count Serini, who is now a Prisoner there, for having held a Correspondence with Count Teckelely and the Turks, has been several times examined, and that it appears he persuaded the Grand Vicer to undertake the Siege of Vienna, having assured him that the place was wholly unprovided for it, as indeed it then was; but 15 or 16000 men put themselves into the Town, and several Boats arrived there with Ammunition the day before the Turks set down before it.

Brussels, August 17. Our last German Letters brought a confirmation of the advantage which our former told us the Duke of Lorraine had obtained upon Count Teckelely; and add, that the Regiments of Baden and Grana, which came from Raab, having joined the Imperial Army, the Duke of Lorraine was marched back towards Krems, to join the Bavarian and other Auxiliary Troops, and to be ready to pass the Danube upon the Arrival of the Polish Army, with which His Highness hoped to be joined by the 24th of this month. That the besieged in Vienna make a very stout defence, that the Turks are in greater want of Provisions than they in the Town, and that Count Starenberg the Governor has assured

the Emperor that he doubts not to defend the place yet for a considerable time.

Hague, Aug. 17. The States General having received from England, a List of the Names of the Conspirators that are fled from Justice, have given strict Orders for the Seizing such of them as shall be found within their Territories. It is said that Orders are sent to Lieutenant Admiral *Bastiaens*, who commands the Squadron of Men of War which this State has now abroad to go and meet our Ships that are expected home this Year from the *East-Indies*.

Dublin, July 26. At the Assizes held the last week at Wexford for that Town and County, before the Lord Chief Justice *Keating*, Parson *Fackes*, a very eminent Nonconformist Preacher, was upon a full and plain Evidence, found guilty, by a substantial Jury of that County, of Subornation of Perjury, to take away the Life of one *Garret Coursey* of that Town, against whom he bore a Malice, and to save his standing in the Pillory, he paid down his Fine.

Portsmouth, August 11. On Friday last sailed from Spithead the Right Honorable the Lord *Dartmouth*, Master General of the Ordnance, with His Majesty's Ships under his Flag; but was forced to come to an Anchor in *St. Helen's Road*, and still continues there by reason of the contrary Winds.

Windsor, August 14. His Majesty was this day graciously pleased, as a mark of His Royal Favor, to confer the Honor of Knighthood upon *William Halford of Welham*, and *Edward Wigley of Scraptiff* in the County of *Leicester*, Esquires.
