A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the eighteenth day of this instant December; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said eighteenth day of this instant December, to Thursday the fifth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said fifth day of February next, assemble and be held for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Boroughs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said fifth day of February next.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this fifteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and in the ninth year of Our reign.

HEREAS the time limited by His Majesty s Order in Council, of the seventh of May last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar), has expired; and whereas it is deemed expedient that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, and command, that no person or persons whatever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service), do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the date of this Order), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar) or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, for the transporting of the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties imposed in that behalf by an Act, passed in the sixth year of His present Majesty's reign, initialed "An Act for the general " regulation of the Customs:"

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the sixth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the "trade of the British possessions abroad," after reciting, that "by the Law of Navigation foreign " ships are permitted to import into any of the " British possessions abroad, from the countries to "which they belong, goods, the produce of those " countries, and to export goods from such posses-" sions to be carried to any foreign country what-" ever, and that it is expedient that such permission " should be subject to certain conditions," it is enected, " that the privileges thereby granted to "foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those " countries which, having colonial possessions, shall " grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, shall place the commerce and navigation of this country, and of its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled by such foreign country:

And whereas by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the "Customs," after reciting or taking notice of the said Act so passed as aforesaid in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, and after reciting, that unless some period were limited for the fulfilment by foreign countries of the conditions mentioned and referred to in the said recited Act, the trade and navigation of the United Kingdom and of the British possessions abroad, could not be regulated by fixed and certain rules, but would continue subject to changes dependent upon the laws from time to time made in such foreign countries; it is therefore enacted, that no foreign country shall hereafter be deemed to have fulfilled the conditions so prescribed as aforesaid in and by the said Act, as to be entitled to the privileges therein mentioned, unless such foreign country had in all respects fulfilled those conditions within twelve months next after the passing of the said Act, that is to say, on or before the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six; and for the better ascertaining what particular foreign countries are permitted by law to exercise and enjoy the said privileges, it is further enacted, that no foreign country shall hereafter be deemed to have fulfilled the beforementioned conditions, or to be entitled to the privileges aforesaid, unless and until His Majesty shall by some Order or Orders to be by him made, by the advice of His Privy Council, have declared that such foreign country hath so fulfilled the said conditions, and is entitled to the said privileges; provided always, and it is thereby declared and enacted, that nothing therein contained, extends, or

T the Court at St. James's, the 28th day | shall be construed to extend, to make vold or anner any Orde or Orders in Council theretofore issued. under the authority or in pursuance of the said recited Act, or to take away or abridge the powers vested in His Majesty in and by the said Act, or any of those powers, any thing therein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding:

> And whereas the conditions mentioned and referred to in the said Acts of Parliament have not in all respects been fulfilled by the Government of His Most Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, and therefore the privileges so granted as aforesaid by the Law of Navigation to foreign ships, cannot lawfully be exercised or enjoyed by the ships of Spain, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall grant the whole or any of such privileges to such Španish ships:

> And whereas His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to grant the privileges aforesaid, in certain cases, to ships of the dominions of His Most Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, His Majesty doth therefore, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority in him vested by the said recited Acts of Parliament, declare and grant, that it shall and may be lawful for Spanish ships to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the colonies and foreign plantations of His Most Catholic Majesty, goods, the produce of those colonies and possessions, and to export goods from such British possessions abroad, to be carried to any foreign country whatever:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable William Huskisson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Office of Church Commissioners, 13, Great George-Street, Westminster, November 25, 1828.

HE following is a copy of an Order in Council approving of a district being assigned to the new chapel built in the parish of St. Margaret, Leicester, in the county of Leicester:

At the Court at St. James's, the 28th June 1828, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions, and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of J. W. Croker. His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in

law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided; and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete separate and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts, as they with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending Divine Service, according to the rités of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein; the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes:" further provisions are made for carrying such division into effect: and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that the parish of St. Margaret, Leicester, in the county of Leicester, and diocese of Lincoln, contained in the year 1821, when the last census was taken, a population of 15,409 persons, which has considerably increased since that time; that the parish church was the only consecrated place of worship in the parish, and that it affords accommodation for 1,500 persons only; that the said Commissioners have caused a new chapel to be erected in the said parish, wherein accommodation has been provided for 1,800 persons, including 991 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that such chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein; that it appears to the said Commissioners to be expedient, for securing a due ecclesiastical superintendance of the parish, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, that an ecclesiastical district should be assigned to the new chapel, under the provisions of the said Act passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty's reign, and that such district should be named St. George's District, with boundaries as follows: the boundary line to commence at 30 feet north of the north west angle of the Humberstone and Gallowtree-gates (No. 1), as described in the plan an-

nexed to the representation, to pass along the centre of a street called Humberstone-gate, by the north side of St. Margaret's Workhouse (No. 2), and then to turn off at an obtuse angle along the centre of a street called Wharf-street till it meets in the centre of Wheat-street at the north west angle (No. 3), and then to continue along the centre of Wheat-street in a straight line till it intersects with a line in the centre of the Humberstone-road (No. 4), and then to return back in a westwardly direction along the centre of the Humberstone-road for a distance of about 125 yards (No. 5), when it crosses the same nearly at right angles, close to the west side of a ditch belonging to a close the property of Lord Huntingtower, and adjoining an ancient footpath leading to Evington-lane, as far as the south east angle of the said last mentioned close (No. 6), it then proceeds by the ditch of the same, and other closes belonging to Lord Huntingtower. in a south westwardly direction, by what is called the Old Enclosure Ditch, by the end of a certain lane leading into Rutland-street (No. 7), and from thence it proceeds in an irregular line and close to the ditch, in the line of the Old Enclosure, till it meets the Bridle-road leading from the London-road to the Humberstone Toll-bar (No. 8), and then returns by the southern extremity of the parish, and from thence by the old westward line of the parish adjoining the parish of St. Mary, also in a north western and eastern direction, by the boundary line of the parishes of St. Mary and St. Margaret, till it again joins the before mentioned north west angle (No. 1) of the Humberstone gate: that the consent of the Bishop of the diocese has been obtained as required by the said Act passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign; and humbly praying that His Majesty would be pleased to take the said circumstances into consideration, and to make such order therein as to His Majesty should seem meet; His Majesty having this day taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council. to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, according to the provisions of the said Acts.
