A Copy of a Letter from the Count de Starenburg Governor of Vienna, to the Duke of Lorrain, Dated August 27. 1683.

Call my felf at Your Highness's feet, most humbly to I thank your Highness for the goodness you were pleased to express rowards me in your last Letter. Your Higkness knows i am perfectly Devoted to Jan, and that I defire nothing more passionate y than b) m; mist kumbig sent vices to render my felf worthy thereif. Since my last the Enemy bave sprung 6 or a Minas in the Raveim; which, after buving repuised them, we trefently repaired again, and we flill maintain our Retrenchments. the Enemy having bothers p gained no more than, a Lidge ment on the Point of the Kayeiin. We feerch uhore and under Ground, and have Countermined three of the Enemies Mines, and sprung two Mines, which had good effect, and would have had better, were our Adiners more brave and expert, but being People which we get together any way, it is impossible to make them re enter a Mine when they once bear the Enemy at week . In the Conterscarp the Entry have I ken ie grung three Mines near a Retrenchment, Paigudo, a, nhich we fell maintain, 19 cover the Capaniers we have in the Duch and ilê the Pal Sudoes were in some stag steater down b. the last Mine, yet, or men main gia hibe Pefe with their Snords in their faid, til. Juch time as they never mide good ag in, and we do stil keep it. The Enemy lave again made two descents into the Lifeb, the enclowards the Bastion of Lebel and the other towards that of the Courte. from whence cur men did in open day, unaer the favor of the Fire we gave upon the Enemy two hours togethers very bravely diflodge them, while others, Commanded for that purpose, filed up their Works and burnt their Gabions and Galleries, so that they must now begin again. But, Sir, it is time to Succor us, we lose a great men, and many Officers, more by the Boody flux than by the Fire of the Enem., for there dies annost every day 60 of thu d flemper; we have to mare Grenado-s, which was our lest defence; our Carnon are pa t.y spoiled by the Ehemy, and parely burft, not having enda-red off ot ly reason of the badness of their Metal; And the Enemy finding they cannot with find's nimb, rs lodge them, elves in the Little make great Lodgments on the Counter, carp, to keep a great number of nen there, and to make an extraordinary Effort.
