

other, and may be easily beaten if they stay for your Highness here, which I do not believe they will do. They are not at present 60000 fighting men, and one Camp may be beaten before it can be assisted by the other. We expect Your Highness with the greatest impatience, but I not so much to be delivered of this Siege, as to have the honor to assure your Highness of the respect with which I am, &c.

P. S. At this Instant my Miners inform me, that they hear the Enemy working beneath them under the Bastion of the Court; They must have passed the Ditch under ground, and there is no more time to be lost.

Francfort, September 6. The Letters from Lintz give us an account that the King of Poland had joynd the Imperial Army the 29th with 15000 Horse; and that his Infantry, as likewise the Troops of the Elector of Saxony, were expected in three or four days: and that all things were disposing for the relief of Vienna, which began to be very much pressed, the Enemy being lodged in the Ditch, and having brought their Mines under the Bastion, near which is the Emperor's Palace. From Raisibonne they write that the States of the Empire assembled there, have declared, it is their opinion that the Truce offered by his most Christian Majesty, should be accepted, but that a longer time be desired to adjust the Conditions upon which it is to be made, and the time it is to last.

Cologne, September 10. The Letters we received by the last Post from Lintz, inform us, that the King of Poland had joynd the Imperial Army with his Cavalry, consisting of 18000 men, most of them Polish Gentlemen, who have each of them a Servant or two; and that the Foot, which it was said were 15000 strong, were expected in two or three days: The Letters add, that the Duke of Lorraine had taken a small Island near Vienna, which will be of great use to him, and that the Turks do very much press the Siege of Vienna, the Grand Visier having, as they say, sworn that he will take the Place, or loose his Life before it. The last account we have of the Siege, comes in a Copy of a Letter written by the Governor to the Duke of Lorraine on the 27th past, wherein he presses his Highness to hasten to their relief. On the first instant the Chapter of Munster chose our Elector Bishop of that See; and it's said his Electoral Highness will make the Bishop of Strasbourg his Coadjutor.

Hamburg, Sept. 10. The King of Denmark is still at Rensburg; and the Sieur Meinders and Sieur de Groot, who are there on the part of the Elector of Brandenburg, and the Duke of Hanover, have had several Conferences with the Ministers of that Court. From Berlin they write that 15 Brandenburg Regiments that have had their Quarters in Prussia, are marching to Crossin, where his Electoral Highness intends to form a Camp. The Elector of Cologne is chosen Bishop of Munster.

Hague, September 14. The 12th Instant arrived here an Express with Letters from the Marquis de Grana, to give the States-General and the Prince of Orange an account of the proceeding of the French in Flanders. We have Letters from Stralsund, which tell us, that the Danish and French Fleet, consisting of between 50 and 60 Sail, had been seen off of Bornholm, but that it was not known whether they were going. They write from Lintz of the first Instant, That the Turks made a very terrible Storm upon

Vienna the 29th past, but that the Letters from Passaw make no mention thereof.

Brussels, September 10. The Marschal d'Humieres continues still at Lessines, from whence it's said he will remove in a day or two; and the Count de Montbron commands a flying Camp between Dixmude and Bruges; in the mean time the Country suffers very much. Such as desire Safeguards, have them for their Houses, Goods, and Horses, but for their Cattle, Corn, Hay, and other Provisions, there is no Protection. We told you in our last, that the Magistrates of this City have undertaken to raise and maintain 2000 men, since the States of Brabant following their Example, have made the Marquis de Grana a Present of 200 thousand Florins in ready Money, to buy Horses for the dismounted Cavalry and Dragoons, which was very acceptable to his Excellency in this Conjunction. Several Dutch Troops are marching towards Bolduc, where they are to Encamp, and at the same time their Frontier Garisons on this side are reinforced.

Paris, Sept. 15. The Marschal d'Humieres, as our Letters from Flanders tell us, was encamped between Aeth and Grammont, from whence he had sent out several Parties. He has laid a Tax upon the Country of Alost, and set a day for the payment of it. Monsieur du Quesne continues still before Argiers, and toatt ck that place with his Bombs, but the season that's coming on will, it's believed, oblige him to return home very suddenly, having already sent away the Gallies. The News we have here concerning Vienna, is in general, that the place holds out bravely, and that the King of Poland was joynd with the Duke of Lorraine, and marching to its relief.
