The following Addresses having been presented to His Majesty, His Majesty was pleased to receive them very graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The most humble Address and Submission of the Mayor, Bayliffs, Burgessees, and Commonalty, of Your Majesties Antient Corporation of Your Town, and County of Peole, at the Guild-hall assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

From the deepest Sense of our Duty, and Gods great mercy to us, in the happy Deliverance of your Sacred Person, and Dearest Brother, James, Duke of York, from the late Barbarous and bloody Conspiracy, contrived and carried on by men of Traiterous and Hellish Principles; We do most humbly beseech your most Gracious Majesty, to accept this our most hearty and sincere Mite, which (like the poor Widow) we do call in the Treasury of Addresses; being heartily sorry we have not done it sooner; most humbly assuring your Majesty, That we do detest, and from the bottom of our Hearts, abhor this so Devilish and Hellish a Conspiracy, and do heartily pray the King of Kings, and Governour of all things, (whom we blefs for your Majesties late signal and Miraculous Preservation) to continue His wonted Providence to You, and grant your Majesty long Life, and a prosperous Reign over us.

And we do most humbly Supplicate your Majesties Gracious acceptance of our Lives and Fortunes, which we are mutually resolved to expose in the Defence of your Sacred Person, your Royal Brother, and lawful Successors, and the Government by Law established, both in Church and State, from all Treasonable Conspiracies and Traiterous Associations.

And we do faithfully Engage, That whensoever your Majesty shall vouchsafe to call your Great Council in Parliament, we will choose such Persons for Burgessees, whose actions shall give us greatest hopes of Loyalty.

And whereas, notwithstanding your Majesty hath been most Graciously pleased, since your Happy Restauration to this your Kingdom and Crown, by a Charter granted unto us, in the Eighteenth Year of your Majesties happy Reign, not only to Confirm all those our Liberties and Franchises, granted to us in several Charters of your Royal Predecessors, but also therein of your Royal Goodness, to make an addition of several other Liberties and Priviledges to us; Yet such is our great Unhappiness at this time, by the ill management and abuse thereof, (by some amongst us) to have given your Majesty such Just cause of Displeasure, as to cause a QUO WARRANTO to be brought against them: We do therefore in all Humility, and with the greatest Submission, prostrate our selves at your Royal Feet, earnestly Entreating Your Gracious Pardon for every Offence, whereby we have any ways incurred your Majesties Displeasure, and that of Your great Goodness You will not Ruine so Antient, and (may we presume to say it) Loyal Corporation and Town, and County, for the Miscarriages of a few Disaffected Persons; but that your Majesty would most Graciously Incline to shew the same Princely Clemency and Compassion to us, as You have of late to your Royal City of London, by continuing to us our Antient Liberties and Franchises, Referring to your Majesty, and Successors, the Approbation and Confirmation of our respective Mayor, Bayliffs, Sheriff, Recorder, Town-Clerk, or any other Officers, in such manner as Your Majesty in your Princely Wisdom shall think fit.

And we in the Name of our selves, and of all the Inhabitants of this Town and County, do most humbly tender to your Majesty, the most faithful and sincere Promises and assurances of constant Loyalty and Redfast Obedience to Your Sacred Majesty, your Heirs, and lawful Successors, and of our dutiful and careful Administration of the Government of this Town and County for the future; and we do most

Humbly submit our selves, in all things relating to our Charter, to your Majesties good Pleasure, which we in all Humility beg to receive, being resolved with one Consent, to yield Obedience thereunto, with all Humility and Thankfulness.

In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our Hands, and caused the Common-Seal of this Town and County to be affixed, this 25th. day of September, Anno Dom. 1683. and in the Five and thirtieth Year of Your Majesties Reign.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and other His Majesties Commissioned Officers in the County of Radnor.

SHEWETH,

That we your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, being made very apprehensive of a most Horrid, Traiterous, and Bloody Conspiracy against the Lives of Your Royal Person and Dearest Brother, James, Duke of York, as well by the Confession, as the Conviction and Flight of several Persons, who had engaged themselves in an unparalleled Villany, secretly and maliciously agitated amongst the worst of men, Fanatical, Atheistical, and Antimonarchical Persons, whose pernicious Principles, Councils, and Designs, manifestly appear to us to have been for nothing less than the utter Ruine and Subversion of the best of Governments, as it is now Established in Church and State, and thereby to have involved the whole Nation once again in an Anarchy and Confusion, the worst of Conditions, had not the unwearied Providence of Almighty God interposed and put a stop to the growth of the Devilish Councils and Machinations of such wicked and unreasonable men, for which extraordinary and wonderful Deliverance, we shall ever adore His infinite Goodness and Mercy.

And we do, as particularly in Duty bound, renew our Engagements with all the Solemn Protestations we can, to defend your Sacred Majesty, and lawful Successors, with our Lives and Fortunes, and beseech your Majesty to rest assured, That we in our several Stations, shall never be wanting in the utmost of our endeavours, to promote your Majesties Service, the Preservation of the Government, and the Suppression of Faction. And as Your Majesty hath been Graciously pleased to intrust us with Commissions for that purpose, So we are readily determined to omit no Opportunity wherein we may express our diligence and duty, there being nothing here nearer or dearer to us than your Majesties Service and Safety. And these our Resolutions are enforced with our constant Prayers; That You may subdue and have Success over all Your Enemies, that they may be covered with the thick clouds of Shame and Confusion, and that the whole course of Your Reign over us may be happy and long, under the continual Providences of Almighty God for your Preservation.

The Congratulation of the Master, Wardens, and Commonality of the Art or Mystery of Shipwrights.

Most Dread Sovereign,

Your Majesty having on all occasions been Graciously pleased so far to encourage our Art, and the Artists therein, as to grant to us as free an Access to your Royal Presence, as to any of Your Subjects; how much soever Superior to us in Rank and Quality: And your Majesty likewise having a more Comprehensive Knowledge of the Mystery of Naval Architecture, than any of Your Royal Progenitors, and by Your Directions been pleased, so far to contribute to our Improvement therein, that it is but Just we should acknowledge, that in our Building for you, and the Defence of Your Realm, the most Serviceable Ships in the known World, Your Majesty hath been the Master-Builder, and we but Your Foremen: We are not only by our Allegiance and Duty, but by Particular Tyes of Gratitude, bound to appear before You, as with the deepest Impression of Joy in our Minds; for your

Dread Sovereign,

THOUGH we have formerly with all pious humble acknowledgments observed the miraculous Instances of Divine Providence which have been more frequently exerted in the Preservation of Your Majesty, than any Monarch that ever sway'd the British Scepter; yet we should be notoriously, indeed profanely ungrateful to Your Gracious Preserver, (and therein ours also) should we not in a more particular obsequious Address, congratulate Your late signal Deliverance from the execrable Machinations of desperate Assassins, of the blackest hue under the conduct of the Prince of Darkness; The Conflagration at New-market served like Elijah's Fiery Chariot, not only to effect but expedite the safety of Your Majesty, and of Your Royal Brother; and consequently of Three Kingdoms, which had been otherwise imbrued in Blood, enrag'd in Distrac'tion, inwrapped with Confusion, as with a Cloak.

Most Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, do humbly prostrate our selves at Your Majesties Feet, with all the Duty, Faith, and Allegiance, the strongest and most Emphatical Composition of words can express, repeating again to Your Majesty, the offer of our selves, our Lives and Fortunes, to be with all cheerfulness devoted to Your Majesties Service. We bless God for the Preservation of Your Majesties most Sacred Person, and Royal Brother, from the late Designs and Conspiracies of most Horrid and accursed Traytors, Men whom Indulgence had made wanton, and many Favours had made proud, who assumed the name of Protestants to the Scandal of the Religion, and who under colour of Piety and Zeal, would a second time involve these flourishing Kingdoms in Blood and Confusion, rob us of so great, so good and just a Head as Your most Sacred Majesty, and make our Church once more a Den of Thieves; that under the specious colour and pretence of Magna Charta and Property, would make the Sword the Scepter, and Arbitrary Power the Law. Lisbon, September 14. The twelfth instant *Dom Alfonso* the Sixth, King of *Portugal*, died suddenly of an Appoplexy at the Castle of *Cinra*, about seven Miles from this place, in the fortieth year of his Age. This week was published here an Edict, by which it is ordained, that all Persons that shall be convicted before the Inquisition of Judaism, Heresie, or Apostasie, shall within two months after Sentence is pronounced against them, depart the Kingdom, and never return upon pain of death and Confiscation of Goods; and that their Wives or Husbands, and their Children being above seven years old, shall be at liberty to go with them, or to remain in *Portugal*, as they shall like best. We have advice that the *Portuguese* are repossessed of the Isle of *St. Gabriel*, pursuant to the Treaty made between this Crown, and that of *Spain*, by the Duke of *Guinazzo*.

Genova September 29. Two days since arrived here the *Diamond* from *Marfeilles*. Here are in Port eight Sail of *English* Ships bound to several Places.

Madrid, Sept. 30. On the 13. instant Cardinal *Mellini*, the Popes Nuncio in this Court, having been abroad to take the Air, at his return was stoped near one of the Gates of this place, by some Guards of the Custom-House, his Coach vieted, and a little Skin of Wine, which some of his Servants had put into the Box unknown to him, taken out of it, whereof his Eminence having some days after made Complaint to the King, the chief Judge of the Wine-Duties, by whose permission the Guard committed this Insolence, was on the 21. sent Prisoner to the Castle of *St. Orens*; one of the Guards fled, and the rest were imprisoned; of these one was Shaved, and being set quite Naked upon an Ass, was exposed to publick Shame in the principall Streets, and afterward sent to the Gallies for ten years. They write from *Alicant* of the 10. Instant that Monsieur *du Quesne* was arrived at *Iviza*, in his return from *Argiers*, not having been able to bring those People to submit to the Terms he demanded; but that he had left a small Squadron under

der the command of the *Chevalier de Chasteau-remants*, to Block up *Argiers* during the Winter. The Spanish Armada, after having been very much shattered by bad Weather in the Gulf of Lyons, is arrived at *Naples*, where they expected to find a Supply to revictual them, but were wholly disappointed, as their General has advised his Catholic Majesty by an Express from thence. We are told from *Cadix*, by a Courier, who arrived here two days ago, that a Fleet of English Men of War had been seen off of that place, which is supposed to be that under the command of the Lord *Dartmouth*.

Lintz, Sept. 30. Our Advices from *Hungary* give us an account, that the Christian Army had pass'd the *Danube* at a place called *Fischs* near *Presbourg*, the Bridge of Boats which they made use of for their passing that River at *Tuln*, having been brought thither for this purpose; That they would Besiege *Gran* or *Newbeusel*, and afterwards take their Winter-quarters in *Hungary*; That Count *Tেকেley*, who was encamped with his Troops at *Klendau*, had been summoned by the Grand Visier to join him; but that he had excus'd it, and at the same time had sent a Deputy to the King of *Poland*, to sollicite his Mediation for the making his Peace with the Emperor; and that the Count *de Budiani*, who upon the Turks falling into *Hungary*, took part with them, had obtained the Emperors Pardon, and had put himself and 4000 Hungarians under the Orders of the Count *d'Estersbist*, Palatine of *Hungary*. We are told, that among other things, there was taken in the Grand Visiers Tent a Cabinet, in which was found an Original Letter signed by many of the chiefest of the Nobility of *Hungary*, wherein they do congratulate the Grand Visier upon his arrival in *Hungary*, and wish his Arms a happy success.

Francfort, October 6. They write from *Vienna*, that by some Letters that have been intercepted in *Hurgary*, they are inform'd, that the Grand Visier had immediately after his Defeat at *Vienna*, sent an Express with Letters to the Grand Signior at *Belgrade*, wherein he acquaints him, that he had been forced to raise the Siege of *Vienna*, through the Cowardize of the *Iassa of Buda*, who basely fled upon the approach of the Christians with the Troops under his Command, that he had done his utmost to oblige his Troops to do their duty, but that being abandoned by his principal Officers, and the best Troops of the Army, he was at last forced to retire; and to make this good, the Grand Visier has not only caused the *Balla of Buda* and two other *Bassa's* to be strang'd, but has cut off the Heads of a great many Officers for not doing their Duty. These Letters from *Vienna* give us likewise an account, that the Emperor has declared the Count *de Staremberg* Marechal de Camp General, and of his Privy-Council; and that his Imperial Majesty has made a Present of a Sword very richly set with Diamonds, to the Prince of *Poland*.

Paris, October 16. We are told, That the King has sent Orders to the Marechal *d'Humieres* to withdraw Troops out of *Flanders* and to put them into their winter Quarters. The news of the Town is, That Monsieur *du Lac* is arriv'd at *Toulon*, having left a small Squadron before *Argiers*, to Block up that Port. The 13. Instant Signior *Ranzuzi*, the Popes Nuncio, had his first publick Audience of the Duke of *Burgundy* at *Versailles*, being conduct'd thereto by Monsieur *de Boneuil*, Introduc'tor of

Ambassadors. Our Letters from *Germany*, tell us that the Christian Army had pass'd the *Danube* near *Presburg*, and that it was not doubted they would Besiege *Gran* or *Newbeusel*.

Whitehall, Octob. 10. On Monday last His Majesty went from hence to *Newmarket*; and this day His Royal Highness and the Prince, to pass a few days there.
