der the command of the Chevalier de Chasseaurenault, to Block up Argiers during the Winter. The Spanish Armada, after having been very much shartered by bad Weather in the Gulf of Lyons, is arrived at Naples, where they expected to find a Supply to revictual them, but were wholly disappointed, as their General has advised his Catholick Majesty by an Express from thence. We are told from Cadiz, by a Courien, who arrived here two days agone, that a Fleet of English Men of War had been seen off of that place, which is supprised to be that under the command of the Lord Dartmouth.

Lintz, Sept. 30. Our Advices from Hungary give us an account, that the Christian Army had pul-I d the Danube at a place called Fischa near Presbourg, the Bridge of Boats which they made use of for their passing that River at Tuln, having been brought thither for this purpole; That they would Beliege Gran or Newbeugell, and afterwards take their Winter-quarters in Hungary; That Count Teckeley, who was encamped with his Troops at Klendau, had been summoned by the Grand Visier to join him; but that he had excused it, and at the fame time had fent a Deputy to the King of Poland, to follicite his Mediation for the making his Peace with the Emperor; and that the Count de Budiani, who upon the Turks falling into Hungary, took part with them, had obtained the Emperors Pardon, and had put himself and 4000 Hungarians under the Orders of the Count d'Esterbss. Palatine of Hungary. We are fold, that among other things, there was taken in the Grand Visiers Tent a Cabinet, in wh ch was found an Original Letter figned by many of the chiefelt of the Nobility of Hungary, wherein they do congratulate the Grand Visier upon his arrival in Hungary, and wish his Arms a happy success.

Francfort, Odober 6. They write from Vienna, that by some Letters that have been intercepted in Hurgary, they are is formed, that the Grand Visier had immediately after his Defeat at Vienna, fent an Express with Letters to the Grand Signior at Belgrade, wherein he acquaints him, that he had been forced to raise the Siege of Vienna, through the Cowardize of the 1 alfa of Buda, who basely fled upon the approach of the Christians with the Troops under his Command, that he had done his u most to oblige his Troops to do their duty, but that being abandoned by his principal Officers, and the best Troops of the Army, he was at last forced to retire; and to make this good, the Grand Visier has not only caused the Baila of Budaan! two other Baffa's to be firangled, but has cut off the Heads of a great many Officers for not doing their Duty. These Letters from Vienna give us likewise an account, that the Emperor has declared the Count de Staremberg Mareschal de Camp General, and of his Privy-Council; and that his Imperial Majefly has made a Present of a Sword very richly fit, with Diamonds, to the Prince of Poland.

Troops out of Flanders and to put them into their winter Quariers.
