HE King has been pleased to command, that the Great Officers of State, His Majesty's Ministers, and the Officers of the Royal Household, who assist at the Interment of His late Most Sacred Majesty King George the Fourth, of blessed memory, do appear in their state uniforms, black waistcoats, breeches, stockings, and buckles, uniform swords with crape, and black feathers in their hats; and that all Officers of the Army and Navy, who attend

at the Solemnity, appear in their respective full dress uniforms, pantaloons and boots, with the mourning directed to be worn by them at Court, as notified in the Gazette of the 28th of June last.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to "empower His Majesty to suspend the training "and regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty,

by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewartry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewartry or stewartries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia to the centrary notwithstanding: and whereas it is deemed expedient, that such training or exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended; and that no training or excreising of the said militia do take place in the present year.
