NOTICE is hereby given, that His Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's-Palace, on Wednesday the 21st instant, on Wednesday the 28th instant, and on Wednesday the 4th of August next, each day at two o'clock.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE KING'S LEVEES, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend the Levee to be held on Wednesday next the 21st instant, are requested to bring with them two cards with their names thereon written, one to be left with the King's Page in attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, who will announce the name to His Majesty. And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, before twelve o'clock on Tuesday next, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation, it being His Majesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 28th instant, are to send

their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 26th instant.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 4th August next, are to send their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve on Monday the 2d August.

MEMORANDUM.

STAFF and Infantry Officers, who attend His Majesty's Levee, are to appear there in full dress coats, white trowsers, of the pattern prescribed by regulation, and boots.

The sash not to be worn, and the sword belt to be worn under the coat.

Cavalry Officers to appear in the Court dress prescribed by regulation, with this exception, that those of the heavy cavalry are to appear in their cloth trowsers, instead of breeches and stockings.

The mourning to be worn upon this occasion, to be merely a crape upon the left arm, above the elbow.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YOUR Majesty's most dutiful and faithful subjects, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, humbly approach your Royal Person, to congratulate your Majesty on your happy accession to the Imperial Crown of these Realms, to reign over a free, loyal, and united people: we humbly offer at the same time to your Majesty our most sincere condolence on the afflicting loss which your Majesty and the whole United Kingdom have sustained in the demise of your Royal Brother, our late revered and beloved Sovereign; a loss which has inflicted a deep wound on the feelings of all the subjects of the United Empire.

We reflect with pride and gratitude on the pre-eminent glory attained by these realms in the deliverance of Europe from that military tyranny which had well nigh overwhelmed her, but for the energies of Britain, under Divine Providence, during the period in which the Regal functions were exercised by your Majesty's Royal Brother, our late lamented Sovereign.

We exult no less on the superiority in arts to which this country has advanced during the reign of our late Sovereign, of which the magnificent improvements in the metropolis of the empire will exhibit some of the most splendid proofs for ages yet to come.

The stream of time will sweep away the many living grateful witnesses of the amiable manners and endearing condescension of our late departed Monarch, but the faithful page of history will record to the end of time the name of George the Fourth among the number of those excellent Princes who have been at once the rulers and benefactors of their people.

Your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, feel the highest consolation that the Sceptre of these Realms is still swayed by a Prince imbued from his earliest youth

with principles of the greatest veneration and regard for our glorious Constitution and the just liberties of his subjects; and they entertain the fullest persuasion, that that Constitution, and those liberties, will ever find in your Gracious Majesty their best and surest protector; and the firmest conviction, that the interests and welfare of your people, will always constitute the nearest and dearest wish of your Majesty's heart.

Accept, Gracious Sire, the cordial tribute of their most sincere loyalty and affection to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, and the fullest assurance of their fervent prayers to the Almighty Ruler of Princes, that your Majesty's reign may be prolonged in health, in perfect connubial happiness with your illustrious and most amiable Consort, and in every other earthly blessing, to the most extended period of human existence.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

"This dutiful and affectionate address, condoling with me on the loss which I have sustained, by the death of the late King, my lamented Brother, and congratulating me on my accession to the Throne of my Ancestors, is highly consolatory and satisfactory to my feelings.

"I cordially thank you for your assurances of affectionate attachment to myself and to the Queen, my beloved Consort.

"The love of my people, confirmed by the experience of a mild and paternal rule, will be the highest reward and gratification which I can receive.

"I am sensible that the prosperity of the City of London is intimately united with the general interests of the country, and I shall be discharging one of the most important of my public duties, and at the same time gratify my own paternal feelings for the good of my people, by manifesting, on every occasion, a watchful care for your liberties and ancient privileges, and by promoting, to the utmost of my power, your commerce, your industry, and your happiness."

We feel deeply sensible that His late Majesty fully maintained the mighty influence of his Crown among the civilized nations of the world, while he cultivated with exemplary care the blessings of foreign and domestic tranquillity; and the citizens of London must ever remember with the highest gratification that, under His late Majesty's auspices, the metropolis of the British Empire has been continually advancing in importance and dignity, and increasing in magnificence and splendour.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, humbly approach your Royal presence with our sincere condolence on the demise of our late most gracious and beloved Sovereign, and our respectful and cordial congratulations on the accession of your Majesty to the Throne of your Ancestors.

In common with the whole nation, we gratefully look back on the long period during which your Majesty's illustrious Brother ruled over us as Regent or as King. Never can we forget his firmness and energy in war; his mild and constitutional government in peace; his munificent encouragement of arts, literature, and science; and the various marks of his especial and condescending favour repeatedly vouchsafed to that ancient seat of learning to which we belong.

But, amidst our sorrows for such a loss, we derive consolation from the thought, that the Sceptre is now swayed by another Son of the same venerated Sire; by a Prince, whose name, like that of His late Majesty, adorns the rolls of our University; who, trained in British principles and British feelings, assisted, in early youth, to fight the battles and uphold the naval renown of our country, and on the patriotism of whose riper years that country may confidently rely for parental care and protection.

In accordance with these sentiments, we shall labour to inculcate a dutiful and affectionate reverence for your Majesty's august Person and Family, an enlightened love of just subordination and well-regulated freedom, and, above all, the sacred obligation of Christian loyalty; always adding our most fervent prayers, that the reign of which we now hail the

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge:

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, beg leave to approach your Royal Presence with the expression of our sincere condolence on the mournful occasion of the demise of our late illustrious and revered Monarch, your Majesty's beloved and affectionate Brother.

We cannot indeed express in adequate terms the feelings of gratitude excited in our minds by the remembrance of the many blessings which this country has enjoyed during his happy and glorious reign.

The awful events which were passing in rapid succession at the period of His late Majesty's accession to the Regency, are fresh in the recollection of us all. Europe was then engaged in a warfare which threatened with destruction all the establishments of civilized society. In this critical posture of affairs, no private feeling or personal attachment could induce His Majesty to depart from that line of policy, which, in the exercise of his own sound judgment, he considered best calculated to rescue his country from the unexampled dangers with which it was surrounded, and to restore peace to the contending world. To the wisdom of his councils, and the energy of his Government, are mainly to be attributed, under the guidance of a merciful Providence, the brilliant successes of the British arms, and the termination of a long and arduous struggle by an honourable and advantageous peace.

The repose which we have enjoyed during the last fifteen years, has been marked by the same anxious solicitude on the part of our late lamented Monarch to promote, to the utmost extent, the cultivation of the arts of peace. His constant patronage and munificent liberality were extended to every institution which had for its object the advancement of religion and learning, the improvement of society, or the alleviation of distress.

After this heartfelt, though inadequate tribute of respect to the memory of our late revered and lamented Sovereign, we beg to offer our sincere congratulations to your Majesty on your accession to the Throne of your Ancestors. We hail with the liveliest satisfaction your Majesty's gracious declaration—that the greater part of your life has been spent in the service of your country, and that in the administration of the affairs of this mighty empire, you will possess the advantage of having witnessed the conduct of your honoured Father and beloved Brother.

With such experience in your Royal Person, and with these brilliant examples before you, we are fully persuaded that your Majesty's utmost exertions will be used, under the blessing of Divine Providence, to maintain the reformed religion, established by law, to protect the rights and liberties, and to promote the prosperity and happiness of all classes of your people.

With the sincerest professions of our own loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and of our unremitting endeavours to instil the same principles into the minds of the youths,

with whose education we are entrusted,—we unite, in common with the rest of your Majesty's subjects, in fervent prayer to the Supreme Disposer of events, that your reign may be prosperous and happy, that the peace and tranquillity of your dominions may be preserved, and that you may long enjoy the heartfelt satisfaction of reigning with your Royal Consort, our most gracious Queen, in the affections of a free, enlightened, and loyal people.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer :

" I return you my cordial thanks for this public testimony of your respect for the memory of my beloved Brother, and of your affectionate attachment to my Person and Government.

" The sentiments which you have expressed confirm my satisfaction, that to you is committed the important charge of guarding the great interests of religion and morality, and of diffusing the blessings of enlightened knowledge. You have manifested to the world that you have a just sense of the awful responsibility which is thus imposed upon you, and that you are worthy of the sacred trust which you have undertaken.

" It is a duty which I owe to God and to my people, to maintain to the utmost of my power the true profession of the Gospel, and the Protestant reformed religion, established by law, and I have a deep conviction, that I cannot discharge that duty more effectually than by favouring and protecting those ancient Academical Institutions, which teach the sound doctrines of religious and civil duty, and which exhibit to the youth of this country the examples of profound learning and true piety."

A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring all Persons, being in Office of Authority or Government at the Decease of the late King, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS by an Act, made in the sixth year of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled "An Act for the security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line," it was enacted that no office, place, or employment, civil or military, within the kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, or any of His Majesty's plantations, should become void by reason of the demise of Her said late Majesty, Her heirs or successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that every person and persons in any of the offices, places, and employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective offices, places, and employments for the space of six months next after such death or demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next successor to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to go, remain, and descend; and whereas by an Act, made in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for the continuation of all and every person or persons in any and every office, place, or employment, civil or military, within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, and also in all and every of His Majesty's foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, which he or she shall hold, possess, or exercise, during the pleasure of the Crown, at the time of the death or demise of His present Majesty, until removed or discharged therefrom by the succeeding King or Queen of this Realm," it was enacted, that all and every person and persons who, upon the day of the demise of His said late Majesty, should hold any office, civil or military, under the Crown during pleasure, should, under and by virtue of the said Act, and without any new or other patent, commission, warrant, or authority, continue and be entitled in all respects, notwithstanding the demise of His said Majesty, to hold and enjoy the same; but, nevertheless, the same should be held or enjoyed only during the pleasure of the King

or Queen who should succeed to the Crown upon the demise of His said late Majesty, and the right and title to hold and enjoy the same, under the authority of the said Act, should be determinable in such and the like manner by the King or Queen who upon the demise of His said late Majesty should succeed to the Crown, as the right or title to any office, place, or employment granted by such succeeding King or Queen during pleasure, would by law be determinable; We, therefore, with the advice of Our Privy Council, declare Our Royal will and pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, that all and every person and persons who, at the time of the demise of Our late Royal Brother, of glorious memory, duly and lawfully held, or were duly and lawfully possessed of or invested in any office, place, or employment, civil or military, within Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dominion of Wales, town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or any of Our foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, do severally, according to their places, offices, or charges, proceed in the performance and execution of all duties belonging to their respective offices, whilst they shall hold the same respectively during Our pleasure; and We do hereby require and command all Our loving subjects to be aiding, helping, and assisting at the commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the performance and execution of their respective offices and places, as they and every of them tender Our utmost displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their peril.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, this twenty-eighth day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the first year of Our reign.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, certain duties on sugar imported into the United Kingdom, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty.

An Act to continue compositions for assessed taxes for a further term of one year, and to grant

relief from, and alter and repeal the said duties in certain cases.

An Act to subject to duties of Customs, goods the property of the Crown, in case of sale after importation.

An Act to impose additional duties of Excise on spirits.

An Act to impose an additional duty of Customs on spirits, the produce of the British possessions in America.

An Act to repeal certain of the duties on cyder in the United Kingdom, and on beer and ale in Great Britain, and to make other provisions in relation thereto.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland, and to grant allowances in certain cases to Subaltern Officers, Adjutants, Paymasters, Quartermasters, Surgeons, Assistant-Surgeons, Surgeons'-Mates, and Sergeant-Majors of the militia, until the twenty-fifth day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act to make further regulations with respect to army pensions.

An Act to consolidate and amend the several Acts relating to the office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy.

An Act to abolish certain fees and stamp duties chargeable on the renewal of all appointments, commissions, grants, pensions, and patents, consequent on the demise of the Crown.

An Act for altering and amending the law regarding commitments by Courts of Equity for contempts, and the taking bills pro confesso.

An Act for making better provision for the disposal of the undisposed of residues of the effects of testators.

An Act to alter and amend the law relating to illusory appointments.

An Act for consolidating and amending the laws for facilitating the payment of debts out of real estate.

An Act to continue and amend the laws for the relief of insolvent debtors in England.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the fifth year of His present Majesty, for the transportation of offenders from Great Britain, and for punishing offences committed by transports kept to labour in the colonies.

An Act to reduce the rate of bounties payable upon the seizure of slaves.

An Act to authorise the advance of a certain sum out of the Consolidated Fund, for the completion of the Shubenacadie Canal, in Nova Scotia.
