- From the Bishop of London, the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, and the Clergy of London and Westminster.
- From the Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the three Denominations, residing in and about the Cities of London and Westminster; and
- From the Members of the Religious Society of Friends, commonly called Quakers; the two latter being on the occasion of His Majesty's Accession.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,
