To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The loyal Address of the Presbytery of Edinburgh.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Edinburgh, beg leave to approach your Majesty, for the purpose of expressing our mingled sentiments of condolence and congratulation, on the death of our late beloved King, and your Majesty's auspicious accession to the Throne of the United Kingdom.

Our late Sovereign was eminently endeared to us, both by his princely virtues, and by the national ad-

vantages which we derived from his Government. Before he succeeded to the Throne of his Ancestors; he had established a claim, almost unexampled, to both our gratitude and our confidence, by the wisdom and the success of his measures in the exercise of a delegated power. After too many of the Nations of Europe had been subjected to a tyrannical sway, and our own Country to the miseries and hardships of a protracted war, it was chiefly by his exertions, under the blessing of God, that peace was re-established, among the Nations, on the ancient and salutary basis of mutual independence. At that interesting crisis, he became, in a great measure, the arbiter of the civilized world; and the honour which was thereby reflected on the Country over which he ruled, he did not fail to maintain during his subsequent reign, by the wisdom and discretion—the energy and moderation of his counsels.

But, though the death of such a Sovereign must be, in any circumstances, deeply deplored, we have great consolation from knowing that the Throne of these Realms is already occupied by another Prince of the same illustrious House, to which he belonged, and under the Government of which our Nation has so long and eminently prospered. We are deeply impressed with a conviction, that, under the reign of Sovereigns of the House of Brunswick, we and our fathers have enjoyed a larger portion of liberty, consistently with good order, and of national prosperity, consistently with a maintenance of the rights and interests of individuals, than has been realized for so long a time to any other people on earth. Thankful to God for these blessings, we feel that we cannot more naturally express our gratitude, than by extending to your Majesty's paternal Government all that filial respect and confidence—all that heartfelt loyalty and allegiance, for which, in time past, we have been so richly rewarded. We delight to anticipate, in your Majesty's counsels, every characteristic feature by which those of your Majesty's Ancestors have been distinguished; and we trust that your Majesty will not account us presumptuous, when we take the liberty of adding, that those professional occupations, to which your Majesty's early years were devoted, induce us to regard your Majesty as peculiarly qualified to reign in the hearts of a people who are so justly proud of that naval bulwark, which has proved their peculiar defence against every foe.

Permit us to advert to one circumstance more, as very near to our hearts: much do we rejoice in the encouragement we have to look to your Majesty's Royal Consort, the Queen, for an example of every female virtue that can bless and adorn the condition of social life.

That Almighty God may bless and prosper your Majesty in all that concerns your Majesty's Person and Government—that He may grant to your Majesty a long reign over a free and loyal and happy people—and that he may also bless and long preserve Her Majesty the Queen, and all the Royal Family—are our sincere and fervent prayers.

Unto His Majesty WILLIAM the FOURTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, KING.

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Scottish Presbytery in London, in communion with the Established Church of Scotland.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Scottish Presbytery in London, do at this season most respectfully offer to your Majesty, our mingled sentiments of condolence and congratulation. In the afflictive dispensation of Providence, which has taken from your Majesty a Brother, and from us a Sovereign, beloved alike by your Majesty's Family and by the Nation, as the Father of his people, we cordially sympathise with your Majesty, and with the other Members of your Royal House; rejoicing at the same time with the Nation, that the British Throne is still occupied by a Prince of the same illustrious race, which has been honoured by Him who ruleth over all, to be the instrument of conferring so many blessings on these lands.

Called by this solemn event to review no inconsiderable portion of our National History, we cannot look back upon the Regency and Reign of George the Fourth, without the deepest gratitude to Almighty God, for the signal protection from external violence and from domestic commotion, which during all that period the British Empire almost alone, among the Nations of Europe has experienced; and for which, under Providence, we have been indebted to the wisdom and energy of those Councils, by which our late lamented Sovereign was enabled to turn the battle from our gates, and to still the tumults of the people.

Nor was the Government of George the Fourth rendered glorious, only by the preservation of his kingdom from foreign invasion and from domestic tumult, for even during the eventful period of the war, as well as since its termination, the foundations of that solid and lasting glory which results from the cultivation of the arts of peace, were greatly strengthened and enlarged. Under the fostering care of your Majesty's Royal Predecessor, the advancement of the Nation in all that dignifies a people has been conspicuous, the interests of learning and science have been promoted, the administration of justice has been improved, agriculture, manufactures, and commerce have flourished, works of public utility have been multiplied, and the arts, whether applied to the comforts or to the embellishments of life, have attained amongst us a degree of perfection unknown to former ages.

Persuaded, nevertheless, that it is righteousness alone that exalteth a nation, and acknowledging with gratitude to Almighty God, that whilst your Majesty's Royal Brother filled the Throne, so much was done to promote the moral and religious instruction of the people, both by the care which our lamented Sovereign exercised in conferring the preferments of the church upon worthy men, and also by the exertions of societies and individuals in forming and supporting institutions for that great object; we must still lament that during the same period there has been proceeding, especially in the larger

cities and towns of the empire, a relaxation of the bonds of society, and with it an increase of crime, a decline of the spirit of piety, and with it a neglect and violation of the ordinances of religion, especially of the Christian sabbath, that bulwark of the land; to resist and to stay which, we trust, will be regarded by your Majesty as the noblest aim of a Christian King, and the highest object of a Christian Government.

Connected as we are by birth and by the ties of religion, with a part of your Majesty's dominions in which the ecclesiastical and parochial institutions of the land are so well calculated to maintain a moral, industrious, and loyal people, we acknowledge especially our obligations to the Princes of the House of Brunswick, for their uniform support of these institutions so justly dear to Scotland, and we confidently rely that they will continue to receive from your Majesty the same protection as from your Royal Predecessors. Nor after the experience which we have had of your Majesty's gracious attention to the Scottish Institutions of the Metropolis, can we doubt that the Scottish Presbytery in London will at all times obtain from your Majesty the same gracious reception, which it has hitherto met with in all its approaches to the Throne.

On our part we venture respectfully to assure your Majesty, that our best endeavours shall be used to inculcate upon that portion of our countrymen, of whom the Holy Ghost has given us the oversight, the duties which belong to them as men and as Christians, teaching them to fear God, to honour the King, and obey the Laws; to cultivate peace and charity, and to live soberly, righteously, and Godly in the world.

We should be also wanting in our duty on this occasion, did we omit to express to your Majesty, how much our joy at your Majesty's accession to the Throne of these Reains is increased, by the consideration that your Majesty is blessed with a Royal Consort, who will share in the honours of the Crown, and in the affectionate regards of your people, and that the virtues and accomplishments of our Queen, equally fit Her Majesty to adorn a Throne, and to be an example to her sex, in every rank of your Majesty's subjects.

That your Majesty, and your Majesty's Royal Consort, may be long spared to be a blessing to each other and to the British Nation, and that your Majesty's reign may be signalized by the progress of pure and undefiled religion throughout every part of your Majesty's extensive dominions, is the fervent prayer, may it please your Majesty, of your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Scottish Presbytery in London, in communion with the Established Church of Scotland.
