St. James's-Palace, July 17, 1830.

The King was this day pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood upon Major-General Willoughby Cotton, Knight Commander of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, and Companion of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

Whitehall, August 20, 1830.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, appointing the Queen, Keeper of Bushy-park, otherwise South-park, in or near Hampton, county of Middlesex.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Most Honourable Francis Charles Marquess of Hertford, K.G. the office or offices of Warden of the Stannaries.
