**T**HE following Addresses, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir Robert Peel, Bart. one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, were by him presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, the President, Council, and Fellows of the Society of Antiquaries of London, most humbly beg leave to express to your Majesty our sentiments of unfeigned condolence, for the heavy loss which your Majesty and the Nation have sustained in the death of your Royal Brother, whose great and exalted virtues, manifested throughout a glorious reign, have left the deepest impressions of reverence and gratitude on the hearts of all classes of people in your Majesty's Dominions.

While we thus presume to testify our sorrow at the death of our late much lamented Sovereign, we humbly beg to offer to your sacred Majesty our heartfelt congratulations upon your happy accession to the Throne of these Realms, persuaded, as we are, that the blessings enjoyed under the paternal Government of our late Monarch will still continue, under the auspices of his august Successor, to be felt and acknowledged by a free, loyal, and happy people.

This Society, which was incorporated by your Majesty's Predecessor, King George the Second, to promote the study of antiquity and the history of former

times, cannot without the highest satisfaction reflect, that the objects which it has in view, and which have been more particularly directed to the illustration of the history and antiquities of our own country, have been extended under the fostering influence of your Majesty's revered Father, and Brother; and we humbly hope that your Majesty will graciously condescend to honour our chartered Society with a continuation of the Royal favour and patronage.

We beg to assure your Majesty of our faithful and affectionate attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government; and we earnestly pray that it may please the Almighty to bless your Majesty with length of days, and with a happy and prosperous reign.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*
