His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually set fire to

the property) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually set fire to the said stack) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**W**HEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that, on Monday the 9th day of August instant, Mr. Simeon Stuckey, of Chard, in the county of Somerset, carpenter and builder, went on a journey of business about ten miles, intending to return home at night; that about twelve o'clock on that night, his horse was found on the road without its rider, who has never since been heard of; that his hat and stick were found on the road the following morning, about four miles from Stratton, near South Petherton, in the same county, which place he had left at half past nine o'clock on the preceding evening; and that from a considerable portion of blood having been discovered upon the same spot, there is every reason to believe that he was barbarously murdered, and his body secreted by some evil-disposed person or persons unknown;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the murder before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who actually committed the said murder) who shall discover his
