And also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Wednesday the fifteenth day of September next, to Wednesday the twenty-seventh day of October next.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

HEREAS by the advice of Our Council, We did ordain a certain Parliament to be holden at Our City of Westminster, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of September next; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that Our said Parliament shall be prorogued, from the said fourteenth day of September next, to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of October next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next.
