WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS by the advice of Our Council, We did ordain a certain Parliament to be holden at Our City of Westminster, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of September next; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that Our said Parliament shall be prorogued, from the said fourteenth day of September next, to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of October next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the first year of Our reign.

THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, assigning districts, under 16th section of 59 Geo. 3, c. 134, to the chapels at Stanley and Alvetthorpe, in the parish of Wakefield:

At the Court at St. James's, the 19th of July 1830, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever; it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent, to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal, and

the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain, and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual persons or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" And whereas by an Act passed in the 59th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect; and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that in the year 1821, when the last census was taken, the parish of Wakefield, in the county and diocese of York, contained a population of 22,307 persons, which has since considerably increased,

there were besides the parish church, two chapels in the said parish, which, together with the parish church afforded accommodation for 3760 persons only; that the said Commissioners have caused two new chapels to be erected in the said parish, in the townships of Alverthorpe and Stanley respectively, which afford accommodation to 3087 persons, including 1556 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that such chapels have been consecrated and divine service is regularly performed therein; and whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to each of the said last-mentioned chapels, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that marriages, christenings, churchings, and burials should be performed therein; and that such districts should be named respectively the Stanley District and the Alverthorpe District, with boundaries as follows: the Stanley District commences at Carr-gate in the Bradford turnpike road, and where the parish of Wakefield adjoins upon the parish of East Ardsley, and proceeds along the Bradford turnpike road in a south easterly direction to Snow-hill; it then follows an occupation road by Red-hall until it opens upon the Leeds turnpike road, thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the Leeds turnpike road to an occupation lane, along which the boundary continues to the end thereof; thence pursues the line of a fence to Pindar Fields, along the northern boundary of which it proceeds until it is intercepted by an occupation road, along which it is marked until it comes into the Pindar Fields road; proceeds along this road in a straight line until it enters the East Moor road along the last-mentioned road; it goes in a south easterly direction to the Aberford turnpike road at East Moor, thence proceeding northwards along the last-mentioned road to an occupation road diverging eastward and directly opposite to the gates leading to the West Riding Pauper Lunatic Asylum; it thence proceeds along the occupation lane to the end thereof, thence along a fence which leads nearly in a direct line to the end of a short occupation lane, along which it passes until it opens on the Welbeck road, thence proceeding in a southerly direction down the last-mentioned road to an occupation lane which leads down to Park-hill Gardens and Charlesworth's Engine, along which lane the boundary is marked to the end thereof; thence along a fence at the end of the same, which leads directly to the River Calder, which at this place parts the parishes of Wakefield and Warmfield, from this last-mentioned point the boundary is marked by the line of the River Calder (excepting in two places, one on the north side of the river, and the other on the south side, as marked and coloured on the map annexed), running in a northerly direction to a place called Cringlesworth, a little way beyond Bottom Boat, betwixt which two places it is the boundary between the parish of Wakefield and the parishes of Warmfield and Normanton; from the last-mentioned

place the boundary proceeds westward by Moor-house, Cockpit-houses, Lofthouse-gate, to Lingwell-gate, and is also the northern boundary of the parish of Wakefield, and adjoins upon the parishes of Methley and Rothwell from Lingwell-gate; the division between the parishes of Wakefield and East Ardsley is also the boundary of the Stanley District as far as Carr-gate, the point from which the description of the boundaries of the Stanley District commenced, and all the places within the district above described, to be considered as in the Stanley District:—the Alverthorpe District commences at Carr-gate on the Bradford turnpike road, and where the parish of Wakefield adjoins upon the parish of East Ardsley, and proceeds along the Bradford turnpike road in a south easterly direction to a small stream of water which crosses the road near Snow-hill; it then follows the course of this stream until it reaches the Balne Beck, which stream it follows to Westgate-bridge; it thence proceeds in a westerly direction along the centre of the road to the inn known by the name of the Swan with Two Necks; thence proceeding along the Huddersfield turnpike road, by Supset-bar, to Dye-house bridge, which parts the townships of Alverthorpe and Horbury; thence proceeding up the stream to Ossett-common, and the boundary hence to Carr-gate is the boundary of the parish of Wakefield westwards, and adjoining upon the parishes of Dewsbury and East Ardsley; and all the places within the district above described, to be considered as in the Alverthorpe District; which boundaries are more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed: that the consent of his Grace the Lord Archbishop of York has been obtained thereto as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third; and humbly praying, that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into his royal consideration, and to make such order therein as to His Majesty shall seem meet; His Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
