A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

**W**HEREAS by the advice of Our Council, We did ordain a certain Parliament to be holden at Our City of Westminster, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of September next; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that Our said Parliament shall be prorogued, from the said fourteenth day of September next, to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of October next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the first year of Our reign.

Brighton Palace, August 30, 1830.

**T**HIS day a Deputation of the Inhabitants and Visitors of Brighthelmston had the honour to wait upon the King to present to His Majesty the following Address, which His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Inhabitants and Visitors of Brighthelmston, humbly approach your Majesty, with the expression of our joy, upon being permitted to welcome your Majesty's arrival amongst us.

When our late Sovereign first visited Brighthelmston, it was a place of comparatively small importance. Your Majesty is now surrounded by forty thousand of your subjects. It may be said, therefore, that Brighthelmston almost owed its birth to the patronage of King George the fourth; and the many local charities which have sprung up under his countenance are standing memorials of the paternal care with which His Majesty watched over the interests of this Town.

Feeling, therefore, how much we owe to the residence of a Sovereign, we hail, with sentiments of the highest delight, the continuance of Royal favour towards us. It is our fervent prayer that your Majesty, with your gracious Consort, may long experience the benefit of our salubrious climate; and that Almighty God may bless your Majesty with increase of years, of honour, and of happiness.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Ministers of the People called Methodists, assembled at Leeds, in their eighty-seventh Annual Conference.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, Ministers of the Gospel in the connection established by the late Reverend John Wesley, A. M., feel it our duty, in common with other bodies of our

fellow-subjects, most humbly to address to your Majesty the expressions of our sincere condolence on the mournful occasion of the demise of our late most gracious Sovereign, your Majesty's illustrious Brother, together with our cordial congratulations on your Majesty's happy accession to the Throne.

It is with feelings of the deepest gratitude, in relation to the adorable Providence of Him "by whom Kings reign and Princes decree justice," that we look back upon the long and eventful period during which the Sovereigns of the House of Brunswick have wielded the powerful Sceptre of the British Empire—a Sceptre which was at first placed in the hands of your Majesty's illustrious Progenitors by signal interpositions of the Almighty, as the means of preserving Great Britain and Christendom from the aggressions of civil and religious despotism, and which in our times has proved the severely tried, but triumphant guard of both against the overwhelming flood of desolation which menaced the subversion of the whole frame of social order and political independence throughout the civilized world.

The era of your Majesty's accession to the Throne of these Realms is marked by the developement of principles affecting both the civil and religious interests of society, which are perhaps more powerful in their tendencies, whether to good or evil, than those which have displayed themselves at any former period, and, as Ministers of that religion, which, in its just and sovereign influence over the minds of men we believe to be the only basis of the true liberty, strength, and prosperity of nations, we cordially rejoice in those gracious declarations of your Majesty, already extensively promulgated, which announce your Majesty's resolution to "maintain, to the utmost of your power, the true profession of the Gospel, as the best security for just obedience, and well regulated freedom."

In the discharge of a Ministry which is widely extended through the British Islands, and in many of the most important and populous portions of the Colonies subject to the British Crown, we have ever sedulously endeavoured to inculcate the principles of civil order, subjection to the laws, and affectionate loyalty to the Throne; and we have ourselves always gratefully borne in mind, and impressed upon our people, the sacredness with which the religious liberties of your Majesty's subjects have been maintained by your Majesty's Predecessors, and the numerous instances in which protection has been extended to our Societies in the West India and other Colonies, when menaced by local oppression; and we receive it as a cheering pledge, that those liberties will be fully preserved to us, at home and abroad, under your Majesty's paternal reign; that one of the earliest acts of your Majesty, after your Majesty's accession, was the gracious disallowance of an Act of the House of Assembly of Jamaica, containing clauses restrictive of the liberty of worship among the Societies under our pastoral charge in that Colony.

We humbly beg leave, in conclusion, to express our ardent desire and prayer, that your Majesty's reign may be prolonged through a course of prosperous years, constituting a period ever memorable in the annals of our country for the increase of true religion and piety, the peace and flourishing state of the nation, and for the extension of the invaluable blessing of personal freedom to every class of your Majesty's

subjects in all those dependencies of the Empire where a system of slavery is still upheld; and that it may be replete with manifestations of the special favour of Almighty God to your Royal Person and Government, to your Royal and august Consort; and to all the Members of your Majesty's illustrious House.
