The humble Address of the Mayor and Burgesses of the Borough of Derby, in Common Council assembled.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**WE**, His Majesty's dutiful and affectionate subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Brethren, and Capital Burgesses of the Borough of Derby, in Common Council assembled, while with feelings of deep regret and sorrow we sympathize in the grief occasioned by the late afflictive dispensation of Providence, the death of our late beloved Sovereign, George the Fourth, whose mild and equal rule will be ever gratefully remembered by his people, we beg leave to express our most heartfelt joy, on your Majesty being ordained by Providence to share the honours of the British Crown, by your happy accession to the Throne of these Realms. We do, with that zeal and sincerity which characterize this nation, humbly assure your Majesty, that as the many virtues and amiable endowments which your Majesty possesses in so eminent a degree, cannot fail to bless our beloved Sovereign with every domestic happiness, so will they ever endear your Majesty to a people not more distinguished for their love of liberty, than for their inviolable loyalty and gratitude to those Princes from whom they derive prosperity and protection.

A PROCLAMATION.

*WILLIAM, R.*

**W**HEREAS by the advice of Our Council, We did ordain a certain Parliament to be holden at Our City of Westminster, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of September next; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that Our said Parliament shall be prorogued, from the said fourteenth day of September next, to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of October next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next.

A PROCLAMATION,

*For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for the preventing and punishing of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality.*

WILLIAM, R.

**WE**, most seriously and religiously considering that it is an indispensable duty on Us to be careful, above all other things, to preserve and advance the honour and service of Almighty God, and to discourage and suppress all Vice, Profaneness, Debauchery, and Immorality, which are so highly displeasing to God, so great a reproach to Our Religion and Government, and (by means of the frequent ill examples of the practices thereof) have so fatal a tendency to the corruption of many of Our loving subjects, otherwise religiously and virtuously disposed, and which (if not timely remedied) may justly draw down the Divine vengeance on Us and Our Kingdom; We also humbly acknowledging that We cannot expect the blessing and goodness of Almighty God (by whom Kings reign and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and prosperous to Ourselves and Our people, without a religious observance of God's holy laws; to the intent therefore, that Religion, Piety, and Good Manners may (according to Our most hearty desire) flourish and increase under Our Administration and Government, We have thought fit, by the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal purpose and resolution to discountenance and punish all manner of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality in all persons of whatsoever degree or quality within this Our Realm, and particularly in such as are employed near Our Royal Person; and that for the encouragement of Religion and Morality, We will, upon all occasions, distinguish persons of Piety and Virtue by marks of Our Royal favour; and We do expect and require, that all persons of honour or in place of authority will give good example, by their own Virtue and Piety, and to their utmost contribute to the discountenancing persons of dissolute and debauched lives, that they, being reduced by that means to shame and contempt for their loose and evil actions and behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the sooner to reform their ill habits and practices, and that the visible displeasure of good men towards them may (as far as it is possible) supply what the laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent: and We do hereby strictly enjoin and prohibit all Our loving subjects, of what degree or quality soever, from playing on the Lord's Day at dice, cards, or any other game whatsoever, either in public or private houses, or other place or places whatsoever; and We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the worship of God, on every Lord's Day, on pain of Our highest displeasure, and of being proceeded against with the utmost rigour that may be by law: and for the more effectual reforming all such persons who, by reason of their dissolute lives and conversations are a scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further pleasure is, and We

do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesiastical and Civil, and all other Our subjects whom it may concern, to be very vigilant and strict in the discovery and the effectual prosecution and punishment of all persons who shall be guilty of excessive drinking, blasphemy, profane swearing and cursing, lewdness, profanation of the Lord's Day, or other dissolute, immoral, or disorderly practices; and that they take care also effectually to suppress all public gaming houses and places, and other lewd and disorderly houses, and to put in execution the Statute made in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of the late King Charles the Second, intituled "An Act for the better observation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday;" and also so much of an Act of Parliament made in the 9th year of the reign of the late King William the Third, intituled "An Act for the more effectual suppressing of blasphemy and profaneness," as is now in force, and all other laws now in force for the punishing and suppressing any of the vices aforesaid; and also to suppress and prevent all gaming whatsoever in public or private houses on the Lord's Day; and likewise that they take effectual care to prevent all persons keeping taverns, chocolate-houses, coffee-houses, or other public houses whatsoever, from selling wine, chocolate, coffee, ale, beer, or other liquors, or receiving or permitting guests to be or remain in such their houses, in the time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon pain of Our highest displeasure: And for the more effectual proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Assize and Justices of the Peace to give strict charges at their respective assizes and sessions for the due prosecution and punishment of all persons that shall presume to offend in any of the kinds aforesaid, and also of all persons that, contrary to their duty, shall be remiss or negligent in putting the said laws in execution, and that they do, at their respective assizes and quarter sessions of the peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publicly read in open Court, immediately before the charge is given: and We do hereby further charge and command every Minister in his respective parish church or chapel to read, or cause to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least four times in every year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and stir up their respective auditories to the practice of Piety and Virtue, and the avoiding of all Immorality and Profaneness: And to the end that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practised by all officers, private soldiers, mariners, and others who are employed in Our service by sea and land; We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery, and other Immoralities, and that by their own good and virtuous lives and conversations, they do set good examples to all such as are under their care and authority, and likewise take care of and inspect the behaviour of all such as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any the offences aforesaid, as they will be

answerable for the ill consequences of their neglect herein.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, this twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the first year of Our reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the training and regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewardry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewardry or stewardries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas it is deemed expedient, that such training or exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of that part of the United Kingdom called Great-Britain, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended; and that no training or exercising of the said militia do take place in the present year.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place, but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and con-

tinue suspended for the period specified in any such Order in Council, and from time to time by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension as long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by an Order in Council, made the sixteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, it was ordered by His late Majesty in Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia should take place for the space of one year from the said sixteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, but that the ballot or enrolment should remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the said sixteenth day of July; and whereas it is deemed expedient to continue such suspension of the ballot and enrolment for the local militia for the space of one year from the sixteenth day of July next; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year from the sixteenth day of July next, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended, from and after the sixteenth day of July next, for the space of one year.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty's Royal Predecessors were pleased, from time to time, by their respective Orders made in Council, to declare and signify their pleasure, that their servants should have and enjoy all ancient liberties, rights, and privileges; and that none of their servants in ordinary with fee should be enforced or obliged to bear any public office, serve on juries or inquests, or be subjected unto any mulct or fine for not submitting thereunto: His Majesty, this day taking the same into consideration, and thinking it reasonable that all His servants in ordinary with fee, should, in regard to their constant attendance upon His Majesty's Person, enjoy the like privileges with those of His Predecessors, doth therefore hereby order, with the advice of His Privy Council, that the Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, in relation to such of His Majesty's servants who are under his Grace's command above stairs; and the Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household, or in his absence, His Majesty's Officers of the Green Cloth, as to such as are accounted Officers below stairs; and the Master of the Horse, for the servants belonging to the stables, do respectively signify unto the Lord Mayor of London, and to His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, within the city of Westminster, counties of Middlesex and Surrey, and the Mayors, Sheriffs, and Bailiffs, of any corporation, or county, and to all such as may be therein concerned, whensoever there shall be cause for asserting the said privilege, that

His Majesty has thought proper, conformably to the example of His Predecessors in this behalf, to order and require, that His servants should have, hold, and enjoy all the said liberties, rights, and privileges; and that henceforward none of His servants in ordinary with fee, be enforced or any ways obliged to bear any public office, serve on juries or inquests, watch or ward, in any place where they dwell, or elsewhere, nor be subjected to any mulct or fine for not submitting thereunto: And the Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household for those servants above stairs, the Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household, and in his absence, His Majesty's Officers of the Green Cloth for the servants below stairs, and the Master of the Horse for the servants belonging to the stables, are hereby authorised and required to take especial care that this His Majesty's pleasure be duly observed and put in execution; and that His Majesty's Attorney General for the time being be, and he is hereby authorised and required, upon any application made to him by any of His Majesty's servants in ordinary with fee, to cause a stop to be put to all proceedings already had or to be commenced against them, or any of them, for refusing to watch or to serve on juries, or bear or undergo any public office or employment above mentioned; and His Majesty doth hereby further order, that copies of this Order be left with the respective Clerks of the Peace for the cities of London and Westminster, and counties of Middlesex and Surrey; to be kept amongst the records of His Majesty's Sessions, to the intent that due obedience may be given thereunto, and His servants may not be vexed with unreasonable proceedings.

**TY POUNDS** by the said Mr. Jonathan Thompson, to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.

**W**HEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that various riots and outrages have recently taken place in the borough of Kidderminster, in the county of Worcester; that the persons concerned therein proceeded by word of command, and under the direction of certain individuals, who acted as leaders; that certain other individuals were employed at the same time with pick-axes to supply them with stones from the pavements; and that various attacks were made upon the Magistrates of the said borough, when in the discharge of their duty;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the outrages before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who acted as leaders of the rioters as aforesaid) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** is hereby offered to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any leader, or other person who used any pick-axe, or made any assault upon such Magistrates as aforesaid. A reward of **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** is also hereby offered to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the persons concerned in the riotous attack upon the house of Mr. John Gough, jun. and who actually entered the same, or who damaged or feloniously carried away any of the goods and property which were therein. And any person (except as aforesaid) who shall give such information as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of any of the persons concerned in the riotous attacks upon any other houses or property in the said borough, shall receive such proportion of a sum not exceeding **FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS** as the Magistrates, by whom such offenders shall be committed, may deem proper,—no such reward in any case to be less than **TWENTY POUNDS**.
