To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the undersigned Magistrates, Clergy, Bankers, Merchants, Manufacturers, and other Inhabitants of the Town of Birmingham, earnestly desire to offer to your Majesty an expression of our sincere and dutiful condolence in the affliction so recently sustained by your Royal House, on the demise of your Majesty's illustrious and lamented Brother, our late gracious Sovereign, George the Fourth.

Justly sensible of the excellence of a form of government which binds together the people of these realms in a feeling of common interest, in whatever relates to their Sovereign, we beg most respectfully and cordially to congratulate your Majesty on your accession to the Throne of your Ancestors; and humbly pray that He by whom Kings reign may vouchsafe to bestow upon your Majesty, and your Royal Consort, health and length of days, the inestimable blessings of domestic happiness, and the affectionate attachment of loyal, happy, and united subjects.

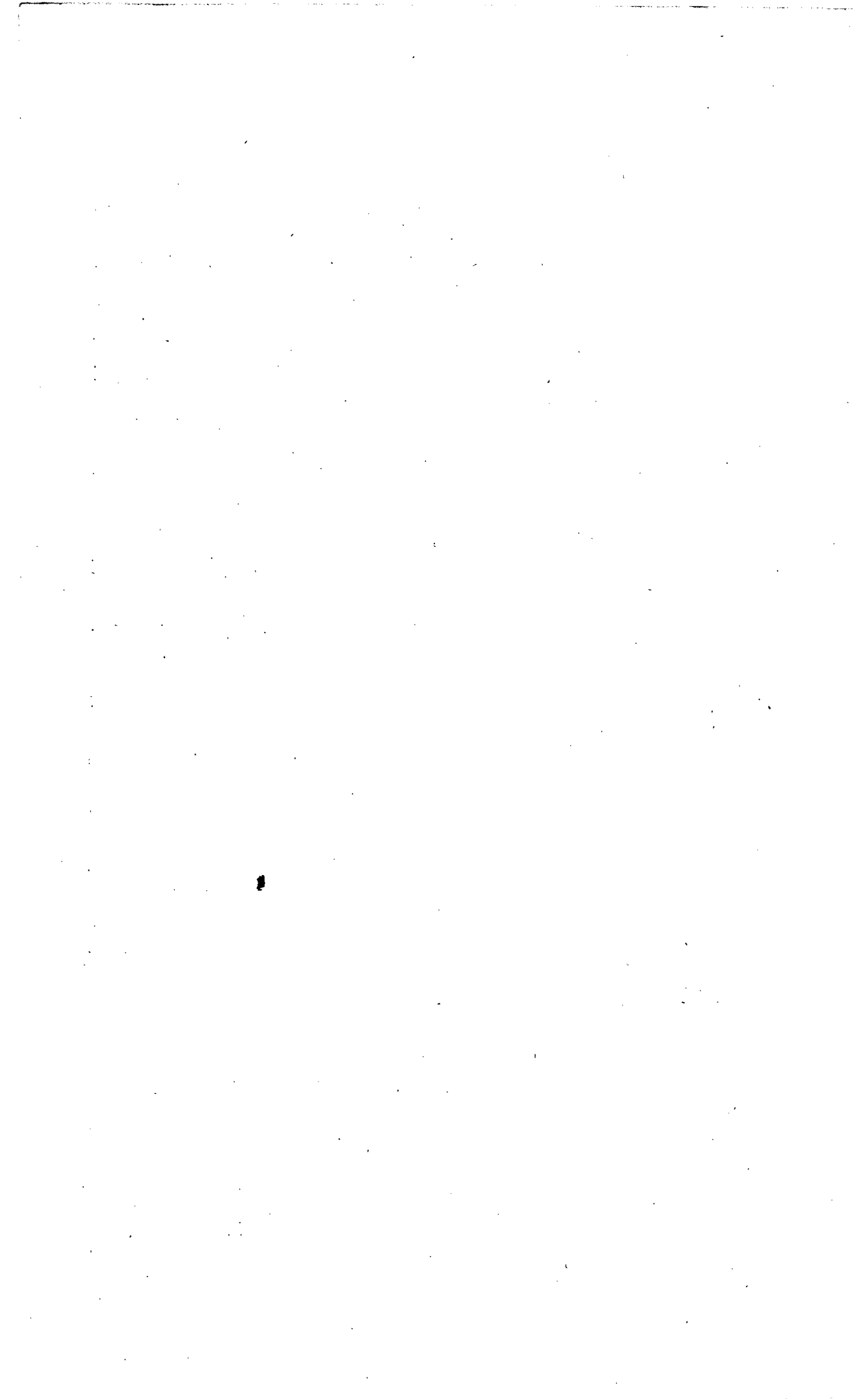
