NOTICE is hereby given, that His Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's-Palace, on Wednesday the 27th of October next, on Wednesday the 3d, and on Wednesday the 10th of November next, each day at two o'clock.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE KING'S LEVEES, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend the Levee to be held on Wednesday the 27th of October next, are requested to bring with them two cards with their names thereon written, one to be left with the King's Page in attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, who will announce the name to His Majesty. And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them (not the Lord in Waiting), should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 25th of October next, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation, it being His Majesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 3d of November next are to send their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 1st of November.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 10th of November next, are to send their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 8th of November.

The humble Address of the Bishop, Dean, Archdeacon and Clergy, of the Diocese of Gloucester.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Bishop, Dean, Archdeacon, and Clergy of the Diocese of Gloucester, beg leave humbly to approach your Majesty with the expressions of our condolence at the loss which you have sustained, in common with the whole Nation, by the death of your Royal Brother, our late lamented Monarch; at the same time we offer our sincere congratulations to your

Majesty upon your succeeding to the Crown of this United Kingdom, with our cordial wishes that you may, by the blessing of Divine Providence, long reign over your loyal and affectionate subjects. The various proofs which your Majesty has already exhibited since your accession to the Throne, of your devotion to the Constitution, both in church and state, as well as to all the excellent Institutions of our Country, afford a happy presage that this Nation will continue to possess, in their fullest extent, all the blessings which it is sensible of having so long enjoyed under the mild and paternal government of the Princes of the House of Brunswick. In particular we feel ourselves bound to express our gratification at the attachment which your Majesty has evinced to the Reformed Religion established in your Kingdom; and we beg permission to return our most thankful acknowledgments for your gracious promises of support and favour to the Ministers of that religion. It is our fervent prayer to the Fountain of all Mercy, that your Majesty may continue many years, assisted by the virtues of your Royal and amiable Consort, to reign over a free, happy, and united people.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Leeds, in the County of York, adopted at the public meeting, held on Wednesday the 22d day of September 1830, the Mayor in the chair.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, for the first time approaching your Majesty since your happy accession to the Crown, beg leave to assure you of our most fervent attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to those principles which seated your illustrious Family on the Throne of these Realms.

We cannot but express our deep regret and disappointment that the efforts of our late most gracious Sovereign, King George the Fourth, and of Parliament, have been productive of so little benefit to that unfortunate class of your Majesty's subjects, the Negro Slaves.

We exult in the institutions of that civil liberty, and the frankness and generosity of your Majesty's character, by which we are permitted and emboldened to declare our decided and uncompromising conviction, that the unhappy and injured beings who toil in our colonies, are just as much entitled to liberty as either the peasants or Princes of England; and that we have no more right to hold them in a state of slavery than they have to reduce us to the same condition, and that every principle of justice and of religion, as well as the spirit of our free constitution, and the dictates of a sound and enlightened policy, demand that they should be totally and forever emancipated.

We, therefore, earnestly entreat that your Majesty would be pleased to direct your Ministers to adopt, with the aid of Parliament, every measure which can be resorted to for annihilating a system so degrading to humanity, and so unworthy of a civilized age; and we cannot forbear humbly expressing to your Majesty our decided conviction, that nothing will amount to a just redress of these wrongs, short of the final and utter extermination of slavery, and that all other expedients for its amelioration would be nugatory.

We implore your Majesty, in justice and mercy, the peculiar attributes of your Crown, to extend your protection to these unfortunate beings, and their innocent but ill-fated offspring, reduced to and retained in a state of slavery from our want of justice and virtue, and not from their own demerits, assured that it would add another brilliant gem to the Crown of England, and your Majesty's name would be handed down to posterity as the friend of the oppressed, and the benefactor of mankind.

Navy-Office, October 6, 1830.

THE Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed money for the payment of half-pay to Sea Officers, from the 1st July to the 30th September last, according to His Majesty's establishment in that behalf; these are to give notice, that the several payments will begin to be made at the Pay-Office, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy; at

ten o'clock in the morning; on the following days, viz.

On the 18th, 19th, and 20th of October, to Admirals, Captains, and their Attorneys.

On the 21st, 22d, 25th, and 26th of October, to Lieutenants and Chaplains, and their Attorneys.

On the 27th and 28th of October, to Masters, Surgeons, and Purasers, and their Attorneys.

After which the lists will be recalled the first and third Wednesday in every month, that all persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and bring with them an affidavit as required by Order in Council of 30th July 1819, the forms of which were published in an advertisement from this Office, dated 16th September 1819, and may be procured at the Office of the Treasurer of the Navy; and in case any of the said Officers should not be able to attend themselves, but employ Attorneys for that purpose, the said Attorneys are to produce similar affidavits from the persons they are employed by.

Where Officers are abroad on leave, their agents are to produce attested copies of such leave, before the half-pay can be paid.

And as by Act of Parliament, passed in the thirty-fifth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for establishing a more easy and expeditious method for the payment of Officers belonging to His Majesty's Navy," it is enacted by the twentieth clause of the said Act, "that if any Commissioned or Warrant Naval Officer who shall be entitled to receive half-pay, and shall be desirous to receive and be paid the same at or near the place of his residence, he may apply to the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, in London, to have such half-pay paid at or near the place of his residence, &c. in the manner pointed out by the said Act;" and by a further Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for enabling the Officers in His Majesty's Navy, and their representatives, to draw for and receive their half-pay," it is enacted by the first and third clauses of the said Act, "that if any Officer in His Majesty's Navy, who shall be entitled to receive any sum of money for or on account of his half-pay, shall be desirous of drawing a bill of exchange for the same upon the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, instead of receiving the same by remittance bill, he shall signify such desire, by letter, to the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy; and that if any Officer in His Majesty's Navy, who shall be entitled to receive any sum of money for or on account of half-pay, shall be desirous of having his half-pay paid to him by extract at any of His Majesty's Dock-Yards where Clerks for the payment of wages for the Navy shall reside, instead of receiving the same by remittance bill or bill of exchange, he is to apply either to the proper Clerk, at the Navy Pay-Office, in London, or at the Pay-Office at such Dock-Yard, signifying such his desire;" notice is hereby given, that the half-pay ending the 30th of September last, will commence paying on the

18th instant; and all persons desirous of drawing for or of having their half-pay remitted to them, may apply as above directed.
