REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE KING'S
LEVEES, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend the Levee to be held on Wednesday the 27th of October next, are requested to bring with them two cards with their names thereon written, one to be left with the King's Page in attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, who will announce the name to His Majesty. And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them (not the Lord in Waiting), should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 25th of October next, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation, it being His Majesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 3d of November next, are to send their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 1st of November.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee, on Wednesday the 10th of November next, are to send their names to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, according to the above regulations, before twelve o'clock on Monday the 8th of November.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS by the advice of Our Council, We did ordain a certain Parliament to be holden at Our City of Westminster, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of September next; We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that Our said Parliament shall be prorogued, from the said fourteenth day of September next, to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of October next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Par-

liament shall, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-sixth day of October next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the first year of Our reign.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 28th day of June 1830,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the training and regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewartry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewartry or stewartries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia to the contrary notwithstanding: and whereas it is deemed expedient, that such training or exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended; and that no training or exercising of the said militia do take place in the present year.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to

empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place, but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order in Council, and from time to time by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension as long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by an Order in Council, made the sixteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, it was ordered by His late Majesty in Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia should take place for the space of one year from the said sixteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, but that the ballot or enrolment should remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the said sixteenth day of July; and whereas it is deemed expedient to continue such suspension of the ballot and enrolment for the local militia for the space of one year from the sixteenth day of July next; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year from the sixteenth day of July next, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended, from and after the sixteenth day of July next, for the space of one year.
