REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE KING'S LEVEE, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend the Leves to be held on Wednesday the 1st of December next, are requested to bring with them two cards with their names thereon written, one to be left with the King's Page in attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, who will announce the name to His Majesty. And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them (not the Lord in Waiting), should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Öffice, before twelve o'clock on Monday next the 29th instant, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation; it being His Ma-jesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations; and further, that no person shall be admitted, on any pretence whatever, who has not been so presented.

It is particularly requested, that Gentlemen who are to be presented at the or plain linen, black swords and buckles.

Levee will have their names distinctly written upon the card delivered to the Lord in Waiting, in order that there may be no mistake in announcing them to the King.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

OTICE is hereby given, that the Queen has appointed Thursday the 24th of February 1831, for the celebration of Her Majesty's Birth-day, when a Drawing-Room will be held at St. James's-Palace.

By the KING. A PROCLAMATION,

WILLIAM, R.

HEREAS great multitudes of lawless and disorderly persons have for some time passed, assembled themselves together, in a riotous and tumultuous manner, in the counties of Wilts, Kent, Sussex, Surrey, Hants, and Berks; and for the purposes of compelling their employers to comply with certain regulations prescribed by themselves, with respect to the wages to be paid for their labour, have had recourse to measures of force and violence, and have actually committed various acts of outrage in different parts of the counties above-mentioned, whereby the property of many of Our good Subjects has in several instances been wholly destroyed, and their lives and properties are still greatly endangered.

We, therefore, being duly sensible of the mischievous consequences which must inevitably ensue, as well to the peace of the Kingdom, as to the lives and properties of Our Subjects, from such wicked and illegal practices, if they go unpunished; and being firmly resolved to cause the laws to be put in execution for the punishment of such offenders, have thought fit, by the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby strictly commanding all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all other Civil Officers whatsoever, within the said counties of Wilts, Kent, Sussex, Surrey, Hants, and Berks, that they do use their utmost endeavours to discover, apprehend, and bring to justice, the persons concerned in the riotous proceedings above-mentioned.

And as a further inducement to discover the said offenders, we do hereby promise and declare that any person or persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the authors, abettors, or perpetrators of any of the outrages above-mentioned, so that they, or any of them, may be duly convicted thereof, shall be entitled to the sum of FIFTY POUNDS for each and every person who shall be so convicted, and shall also receive Our most gracious pardon for the said offence, in case the person making such discovery as aforesaid shall be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

And whereas certain wicked incendiaries have secretly by fire, in many parts of the said counties, destroyed the corn, hay, buildings, and other pro-

perty of Our subjects, We do hereby promise and declare, that any person or persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the authors of the said fires, so that they, or any of them, may be duly convicted thereof, shall be entitled to the sum of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS for each and every person who shall be so convicted, and shall also receive Our most gracious pardon (except the actual perpetrator of any of the said fires), in case the person making such discovery shall be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

And the Lords Commissioners of our Treasury are hereby required to make payment accordingly of the said rewards.

And whereas His Majesty doth deem it expedient, that the port of Sydney, in the island of Cape Breton, should be appointed a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers in him vested in and by the said Act of Parliament, order and appoint, that the said port of Sydney, in the island of Cape Breton, shall be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Sir George Murray, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

HEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to " regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," after reciting, that "by the Law of Navigation foreign " ships are permitted to import into any of the " British possessions abroad, from the countries to "which they belong, goods, the produce of those countries, and to export goods from such possessions to be carried to any foreign country whatever, and that it is expedient that such permission should be subject to certain conditions," it is, therefore, enacted, "that the privileges thereby granted to " foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those " countries which, having colonial possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, shall place the commerce and navigation of this country, and of its posses-" sions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured " nation, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the " ships of any foreign country, although the con-" ditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled by such foreign country:"

And whereas by a certain Order of His said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and twentysix, after reciting that the conditions mentioned and referred to in the said Act of Parliament had not in all respects been fulfilled by the Government of the United States of America, and that therefore the privileges so granted as aforesaid by the law of navigation to foreign ships, could not lawfully be exercised or enjoyed by the ships of the United States aforesaid, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, should grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of the United States aforesaid: His said late Majesty did, in pursuance of the powers in Him vested by the said Act, grant the privileges aforesaid to the ships of the said United States; but did thereby provide and declare, that such privileges should absolutely cease and determine in His Majesty's possessions in the West Indies and South America, and in certain other of His Majesty's possessions abroad, upon and from certain days in the said Order for that purpose appointed, and which are long since passed:

And whereas by a certain other Order of His said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the sixteenth of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven, the said last mentioned Order was confirmed: And whereas in pursuance of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf made and provided, His said late Majesty, by a certain Order in Council, bearing date the twenty first day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three, and by the said Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, was pleased to Order that there should be charged on all vessels of the said United States, which should enter any of the ports of His Majesty's possessions in the West Indies or America, with article, of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the said States, certain duties of tonnage and of customs therein particularly specified:

And whereas it hath been made to appear to His Majesty in Council, that the restrictions heretofore imposed by the laws of the United States aforesaid upon British vessels, navigated between the said . States and His Majesty's possessions in the Weis Indies and America, have been repealed, and that the discriminating duties of tonnage and of customs, heretofore imposed by the laws of the said United States, upon British vessels and their cargoes entering the ports of the said States from His Majesty's said possessions, have also been repealed, and that the ports of the United States are now open to British vessels and their cargoes coming from His Majesty's possessions aforesaid, His Majesty doth, therefore, with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in Him as aforesaid by the said Act so passed in the sixth year of the reign of His said late Majesty, or by any other Act or Acts of Parliament, declare, that the said recited Orders in Council of the twenty-first day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three, and of the twenty-seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, and the said Order in Council of the sixteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven (so far as such last mentioned Order relates to the said United States), shall be, and the same are, hereby respectively revoked:

And His Majesty doth further, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance of the powers aforesaid, declare that the ships of and belonging to the said United States of America, may import from the United States aforesaid into the British possessions abroad, goods the produce of those States, and may export goods from the British possessions abroad to be carried to any foreign country whatever.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Sir George Murray, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WITH feelings of the most profound respect, and a deep sense of the blessing which Divine Providence has graciously bestowed upon these realms, by your Majesty's accession to the Throne, we, the undersigned Female Inhabitants of Derby and its Vicinity, beg to present our sincere congratulations.

to your Majesty on that most important and happy | event. We are persuaded that we cannot more fully set forth the strong sense we entertain of your Majesty's virtuous sympathies in whatever may have a tendency to affect the real good of your Majesty's faithful and affectionate subjects, both in this kingdom and in other climes, than by thus approaching your Majesty, to crave that you will be pleased to exercise that influence which, as Queen Consort of this great country, we know you possess, on behalf of eight hundred thousand of that enthralled, degraded, and oppressed part of God's family, our brethren and sisters of colour in the British Colonies. The system of slavery subjecting them to every species of injustice and oppression revolting to humanity, and totally at variance with the spirit of Christianity; the situation of these our fellow-creatures, is rendered truly lamentable, as they cannot, like your Majesty's happy subjects in England, obtain the redress of their wrongs, by an application to the laws; it having long been most painfully certain that justice is denied them.

We rejoice in having a Queen who is distinguished by works of usefulness and mercy: therefore, as wives, mothers, and daughters, we are compelled most earnestly to implore and seek redress for those wretched victims, who have no means of pleading for themselves, who are continually subjected to unfeeling violations of maternal tenderness. to wretched indecencies, to brutal floggings, and other heart rending woes: and we do trust the daughters of Britain will not plead in vain, when they solicit your Majesty's Royal influence, to prevent the liability of the tenderest ties of consanguinity from being severed, and the cruelty which deprives the female slaves of the power of exercising those domestic and endearing duties after which we all aspire. We, in consequence, feel ourselves bound by a sense of duty and heartfelt sympathy for these our degraded sisters, to use every means in our power to obtain their civil freedom; and that our country, so highly famed amongst nations as the land of liberty, should no longer be subject to the opprobrious inconsistency, of encouraging a system

so contrary to its avowed principles.

The accomplishment of this long anticipated and ardently wished for event, will, under the blessing of Almighty God, add lustre to the brightest gem in the British Crown: and we would now pray, that when your Majesty's works of benevolence and mercy are ended here on earth, your mortal Crown may be exchanged for one of immortal glory, which tadeth not away.
