REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE KING'S LEVEE, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend the Levee to be held on Wednesday next the 8th instant, are requested to bring with them two cards with their names thereon written, one to be left with the King's Page in attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, who will announce the name to His Majesty. And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them (not the Lord in Waiting), should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, before twelve o'clock on Monday next the 6th instant, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation; it being His Majesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations; and further, that no person shall be admitted, on any pretence whatever, who has not been so presented.

It is particularly requested, that Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee will have their names distinctly written upon the card delivered to the Lord in Waiting, in order that there may be no mistake in announcing them to the King.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Vice-Presidents and Members of the

Royal Dublin Society, assembled at our first stated general meeting, since your Majesty's accession to the Throne, beg leave humbly to express the deep regret which we feel, in common with every portion of your Majesty's subjects, for the loss which your Majesty and the Nation have sustained by the death of your Majesty's lamented Brother, our late most gracious Sovereign, and the immediate Patron of our Society.

But, while we deplore that event, our sorrows are alleviated by the heartfelt gratification of beholding in the Successor to the Throne, a Prince, whose early virtues and public services, and the benignity and generosity of whose character have so justly endeared him to the nation. Permit us humbly to tender to your Majesty the homage of our zealous loyalty and most devoted attachment. Nor is it a less grateful duty to offer to Her Majesty, the Queen, the affectionate tribute of our respect, and our admiration of her many virtues and personal endowments.

We congratulate your Majesty upon possessing a Consort so eminently qualified to confer dignity on her exalted rank, and to promote, by her bright example, the welfare and happiness of your faithful subjects. May your Majesties long continue to reign in the hearts of a loyal and contented people.

Associated under the Charter, granted by His Majesty King George the Second, for the encouragement of husbandry and the useful arts, we rejoice in acknowledging upon the present occasion, the great and signal advantages, as well as improvement, which the agriculture of Ireland has derived from the freedom of commercial intercourse with Great Britain, consequent on the Union between the two countries. We further contemplate with feelings of the deepest gratitude the numerous benefits which this country in general, and this society in particular, have experienced during the reigns of three successive Sovereigns, your Majesty's Royal Predecessors; and we confidently anticipate, that Ireland, blessed with a continuance of domestic peace and tranquillity, will, under your Majesty's paternal and beneficent government, attain to a state of prosperity and happiness hitherto unexampled in its annals.

May we hope that the humble efforts which our society is making in this great work of internal improvement, by cultivating the arts of peace, and diffusing scientific knowledge, and useful information, will recommend us to your Majesty's patronage, that in the person of your Majesty we may be permitted to add to the number of our Royal Protectors, a fourth Sovereign of your Majesty's illustrious House, and that your Majesty will graciously condescend to become the Patron of this Society.
