Office of the Lord Chamberlain to the Queen, St. James's, November 25, 1830.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Queen has appointed Thursday the 24th of February 1831, for the celebration of Her Majesty's Birth-day, when a Drawing-Room will be held at St. James's-Palace.

The Queen will not require that any Lady who has already been presented, should be presented a second time.

It is expected that all Ladies attending the Drawing-Room will appear in dresses of British manufacture.

HIS day the following Address was presented to His Majesty at the Levee, by the Bishop of Llandaff, which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects,

the Bishop and Clergy of the diocese of Llandaff' humbly present to your Majesty the expression of our sentiments upon the dispensation of Providence, which has deprived this kingdom of the paternal rule of our late most gracious. Sovereign King George the Fourth, and which has raised up a successor, in the person of your Majesty, justly entitled to the same feelings of affection and dutiful attachment which we had long entertained for that beloved Monarch.

We have been informed of the gracious declaration which your Majesty was pleased to make at the very commencement of your reign, and after the performance of the most sacred rite of our religion, of your firm resolution to protect and support the established Church of this kingdom in all her rights, and to discountenance the malicious attacks of all her enemies.

While we cannot but derive comfort and encouragement from this solemn assurance, and while we tender our grateful acknowledgements to your Majesty for this protection, we are, at the same time, persuaded, that the cause of the English Church and of the English Nation is one and the same, and that, by adhering steadily to this pious resolution, your Majesty will also promote, in the most effectual manner, the peace, the prosperty, the happiness, and the glory of the whole empire.

For ourselves, we solemnly assure your Majesty, that we regard it as a part of the sacred duty of our calling, to inculcate among all ranks of our fellow-subjects, obedience to the laws, and affectionate loyalty to our lawful Sovereign; and we offer our united prayers that the Almighty may long preserve the Sovereign now set over us, an example, as well as a blessing, to His loyal people.
