The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the eleventh year of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to suspend, until the end of the next session of Parliament, the making of lists and the ballots and enrolments of the militia of the United Kingdom," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that any proceedings shall be had at any time before the expiration of such period as aforesaid, either for the giving of notices and

making returns and preparing lists, and also for the proceeding to ballot and enrol men for the filling up vacancies in the militia of the United Kingdom, or any part thereof, as His Majesty shall deem expedient; and upon the issuing of any such Order, all such proceedings shall be had for carrying into execution all the provisions of the Acts in force in England, Scotland, and Ireland, respectively, relating to the giving notices for, and return of, lists, and for the balloting and enrolling of men to supply any vacancies in the militia, and holding general and sub-division meetings for such purpose, at such time respectively as shall be expressed in any such Order in Council, or by any directions given in pursuance thereof to the Lord Lieutenants, or Deputy-Lieutenants acting for Lord Lieutenants, of the several counties, shires, ridings, cities, and places, in Great Britain, or to the Governors and Deputy-Governors of counties and places in Ireland, or to the Warden and Special Deputy-Wardens of the Stannaries, and all the provisions of the several Acts in force in England, Scotland, and Ireland, respectively, relating to the militia and corps of miners of Cornwall and Devon, shall, upon any such order and direction given in pursuance thereof, become and be in full force, and be carried into execution at the period specified in such order or direction as aforesaid, with all such penalties and forfeitures for any neglect thereof, as fully as if such periods had been fixed in the Acts relating to such

militia and miners: And whereas it is deemed expedient that proceedings should now be had for holding general and sub-division meetings, for the giving notices, and making returns and preparing lists; and also for the proceeding to ballot and enrol men for filling up vacancies in the militia of Great Britain it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that within fourteen days in England, and three weeks in Scotland, after the date of this Order, the Lord Lieutenants and Vice-Lieutenants in the several counties, shires, ridings, cities, and places in Great Britain, shall summon, or cause to be summoned, general meetings for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the Acts now in force in England and Scotland respectively, relating to the giving notices for, and return of lists, and for balloting and enrolling men to supply any vacancies in the militia, within the several periods prescribed by the Acts in that behalf made and provided for the execution of these proceedings respectively, and under all the penalties and forfeitures for the neglect thereof, as are directed by the said Acts respectively.

Westminster, December 23, 1830.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to apply the sum of one million eight hundred and fifty thousand pounds out of the Consolidated Fund to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament.

An Act to provide for the administration of the Government in case the Crown should descend to Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandrina Victoria, daughter of His late Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, being under the age of eighteen years, and for the care and guardianship of her person.

An Act to amend an Act, of the last session, for

the better administration of justice, so far as relates to the essoign and general return days of each term, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof; and to declare the law with regard to the duration of the terms in certain cases.

An Act to continue, for the term of six calendar months, all such commissions, appointments, grants, or patents of offices or employments, civil or military, as were in force at the time of the demise of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, and as have not been superseded, determined, or made void during the reign of His present Majesty.

An Act to render valid Acts done by the Governor of any of His Majesty's plantations, after the expiration of his commission by the demise of His late Majesty, and to extend the period within which the patents of Governors of colonies shall, on any future demise of the Crown, become vacant, and to provide for the longer duration of the patents of Governors after the demise of the Crown.

An Act for more effectually repairing and otherwise improving the road from Highgate, in the county of Middlesex, through Whetstone, to Chipping Barnet, in the county of Hertford; and the road from Chipping Barnet to the thirteen mile stone, near Gannick Corner, in the parish of South Mims, in the said county of Middlesex.

An Act for repairing, amending, and maintaining the roads from Marchwiell, through Bangor, Worthenbury, and Hanmer, to Whitchurch, and from Bangor to Malpas, and from Redbrook to Hampton, in the counties of Denbigh, Flint, Chester, and Salop.

Dublin-Castle, December 23, 1830.

The Marquess of Anglesey, who embarked at Holyhead on Wednesday morning the 22d of December, on board the *Escape* steam-vessel, arrived at Kingstown Harbour at eleven o'clock at night. His Lordship, on his arrival in Dublin this day, was received by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin; his Lordship, attended by a squadron of dragoons, proceeded to the Castle, and the Council having assembled, at two o'clock, was introduced in form to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, who received him sitting under the canopy of state in the Presence Chamber, from whence a procession was made, in the usual state, to the Council Chamber; the Council sitting, his Lordship's commission was read, and the oaths being administered to him, his Lordship was invested with the collar of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, and received the sword of state from the Lords Justices. His Excellency afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber and received the compliments of the Nobility and other persons of distinction, upon his safe arrival and taking upon him the Government of Ireland.
