

militia and miners: And whereas it is deemed expedient that proceedings should now be had for holding general and sub-division meetings, for the giving notices, and making returns and preparing lists; and also for the proceeding to ballot and enrol men for filling up vacancies in the militia of Great Britain, it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that within fourteen days in England, and three weeks in Scotland, after the date of this Order, the Lord Lieutenants and Vice-Lieutenants in the several counties, shires, ridings, cities, and places in Great Britain, shall summon, or cause to be summoned, general meetings for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the Acts now in force in England and Scotland respectively, relating to the giving notices for, and return of lists, and for balloting and enrolling men to supply any vacancies in the militia, within the several periods prescribed by the Acts in that behalf made and provided for the execution of these proceedings respectively, and under all the penalties and forfeitures for the neglect thereof, as are directed by the said Acts respectively.
