Madrid, Offober 28. The Duke d'Offuna, who lately returned from his Banithment at Segovia, is fallen under a fresh disgrace, the King had ordered him to be carried Prisoner to the Castle of Montauches near Portugal, but on the 21th instant he got from his Guards just as they were going to begin their Journey, and retired into the Monaffry of the Carmelite; whereupon an Edict was published the 25th, commanding him within three days after Publication thereof, to render himself a Prisoner, which if he do not, he will be procceded against for his disobedience and flight. From Cadiz of the 18th instant, they write; that three Ships were arrived there from Buenos Ayres, after having been out three years, and that they brought a Million of Monny, 60000 Hides, and 12000 L. of From Lisbon of the 19th, we hear that red Wood Monfieur de St. Romaine was arrived there in his fecond Embaffy from France: And that they were making great Preparations for the Coronation of the King Don Pedro the S. cond.

Stockholme, O.lob. 10 The 4th inflant the Moscowite Ambaffadors had their publick Auditnee of the King of Sweden. Being come into the Ciffle, they were met at the foot of the Stairs, by the Sieur Rosenham the Kings Marihall, and at the top of them by Lieutenant-General Bielke and Monsieur Guidensterne, who led them into the Room of Audience, at the upper end whereof was placed the Kings Throne, below it frood Chairs for the Senators to fit on, and between them and the Throne, was placed on each fide a Table, covered with Cloth of Silver, on which lay the Crown, the Sword, the Globe, the Scepter, and the Key. At the Door of the Room of Audience they were received by Count Steenbook Rycks Marshall, and advanting within eight or ten Paces of the Throne, the Chi F of the Ambassadors made a Speech to the King, which was answered by Count Oxensterne. \*\*Hague, November 16.
