I contains accommodation for 470 persons, and in which divine service is regularly performed; and whereas the said Commissioners further represented to His Majesty in Council, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the said last-mentioned chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named St. Thomas's District, with boundaries as follows; the boundary to commence at Trothy Mouth, where the parish of Monmouth joins the parish of St. Mitchel Troy; then proceeding northward, by the Rivers Wye and Monnow, to Richard's Ford, where the parish of Monmouth joins the parish of Rockfield; then returning southward, and continuing nearly the same direction to a stone on the turnpike road leading from Monmouth to Rockfield; and from thence turning westward along the boundary. which separates the parish of Monmouth and Rockfield, to a cross road where the parish of Monmouth joins the parish of Wonastow; then returning southward along the boundary which separates the parishes of Monmouth and Wonastow, to the River Trothy, where the parish of Monmouth again joins the parish.

of Mitchel Troy; and from thence returning eastward, by the River Trothy, to Trothy Mouth, where the boundary commenced, which boundaries are more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, and therein coloured yellow: that the consents of the Lord Bishop of Hereford and of the Lord Bishop of Llandaff have been obtained thereto as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, and humbly praying, that His Majesty would be pleased to take the said premises into consideration, and to make such order in respect thereof as to His Majesty shall scem meet; His Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed¹ district be accordingly assigned to the aforesaid chapel, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
