To the King's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Masser, Wardens, Assistants, and Commonalty, of the Society of Merchants-Ad-venturers within the City of Bristol, at their Gene-ral Assembly in their Hall, upon the 10th day of No-

Lintz, November 9. Ratubonne, Novemb. 11.
