fourty Fort, under the Command of Major Bricheras Lleutensor, to affault another Redoute, cant up on the right hand of the Fore, which they valiantly did, bearing out the Turks, and kiling many of them , bat the Turke after a little while grawing very numerous, they were forced to retire with the loss of the Lieutenant, who was shot dead under the Redout; but being unwilling to leave the Body of their Officer to their Enemies, they turned again upon the Enemy, and with i finice Courage forced them to give way, taking up the Lo-

dy, and with much glory returning to their Works.

The Savoyards also with 60 Officers and Souldiers, and Some Granadoes, Commanded by Collonel Torre, failyed out from the Ravelin of Bethlehem, and fell upon the Enemies Line, where a Body of the Turks were upon the Guard to defend their Ploncers, where was begun between them a warm Difpure, but more of the Savoyards being fent out to their sfliter ce, the Bnemy was besten from the Line, and forced to fave themfelves in fome of their Redout , leaving 60 of their number desd behind them, four of whole Heads they brought away, presenting them to the Captain General, who rewarded their valour with fourty Realls; in this Service they had the good fortune not to lofe above one Sou'-

The Collonels Arberio and Marine, with the Count Brufano Captain of the Guards to the Seignior Marquels Ville, with a Party of 5 Men, Sallying out of the Port St. Mary, forced the Turks out of two Redouts, killing many, and lofing only one Se jeant.

A Squadron from the Fort S. Demetrius did likewife very confiderable execution upon the Turks; our Souldiers in all parts giving great testimonies of their courage and zeal for the defince of the place.

Genoua, Aug. 30. Ten of the French Gilleys are now at S.s., plying about the Illes of S. Margaret; and five Men of War fet fall from Thoulon well Manned and Equipped, and 'dis given out, intended for Algier, to take in and rederm their Captives, but their defign at prefent not publickly known, shough somewhat suspected: These States are now resolving to haften away their Envoy Extraordinary for France. Tis fald some Veffels belonging to the Isle of Majorca have lately feized on feveral French Barques; and by fome thips arrived from Cadit, we are advertised, that the Governour and Magifrates have leized on the Goods and Eff ets of the French there, to the value of a Millon and two nundred thoufand Dollers.

Paris, Sept. 10. His Majefty intending fpeedily to return for this place, has ordered all the Troopes of his Houold to strend him, leaving behind him Mor ficur de Turenne fole General in those parts, with an Army of 1 5000 Men to keep the Field, to make Incurhous into the Enemies Country, and to befirge and take in such places as he shall judge convemient : The Mareschall d' Aumont's Forces are dispersed in-

Their M. jeftles parting the fourth inftant from Bapaume came the fifth to Mouchy, where the next day he received the Complements from the Deputies of Parliament, the Chamber of Accounts, and the Courts of Aydes and Moneys; which done, they came that day to Dinner at Pont St. Mexance, and that night arrived at Senlis, having been in all places received with great Acciamations and much Ceremony, Fleld.

The Marquis de Crequy has Orders to March towards Alfatia with two Bregades, and to exp & farther Ordes from his M jefty et Sauerne ; it being as yet uncertain whether he be defigned to lie upon the Frontlers of Luxembourg to hinder the Enemy from making Incursions upon our Quarters, or to March farther into Brifgow to oppole the passage of any Forces that may be sent that way from the Emperour.

The Government of Lifle is by this MajeRy conferred upon the Ma quis de Bellefonds, and the Lleutenancy thereof upon the Sleur d' Aigremont a Cresture of Monfieur de Zu-

The Marquis de Humieres is ordered to Command a fmall

Army about Charle Roy, to make I cut fi ns upon the Ecemy, and freighten them in th.ir Winter-Quarters; which confirms us in the opinion, that but little farther ection is to be exp. Cled from the Army this year.

Monfieur de Turenne is Fortifying Aloft, and in ends fir fome time to refresh his Army, before he gives them any farther employment againft the Enemy ; and 'tis fall', he has intentions alto of Fortifying the Caftle of Vivourden, it being a convenient Poft from whence to annoy the Country gbout Bruffell .

Fr m Bayonne we are tel ', that our Ambaffador the Archbifhop d' Ambrun, and the Spanish Ambaffacour, the Maioutis de la Fnenie, were arrived upon the borders about Bidafos, where the Excharge was made, and both of them returaing to their respective Countrey', being by an order frem the Queen Regent of Spain kept from entertaining any Conferences.

Antwerp, Scot. 7. The French F ot lie at the prefint encamped shout Deinfe beiween Courtrick and Gbent, confifting of 8 or 9000 men; the Cavalry is returned towards Lille, where on Sunday the 4th Inflant the King and Queen of France made their publick Entry. Since that they are gone forwards towards Paris.

The Prince de Ligny fearing the French might have fome defigne upon Ghent, has put into the Town a succour of 2000 min; the place being before to thinly manned, and foill provided with Necellaries for a Siege, that had the French appeared before it with their Canon, it might probably have been induced to have hatkened after honourable conditions for a furrender.

Antwerp, Sept. 10. Yeller lay part of the Frerch Army, confitting of 8000 men with their Baggage and Artillery appeared before Actit and Ninouen, about five leagues fom Bruffels; but with what deligne we yet know noc: The other part of it about Lille are also moving. Some lew dayes will informe us of th ir defigne; in the mean time the Towns we have left are in fo good a poftu e, that will not invite them to fit down before any of them, confidering the lateness of the year and the absence of their King.

Flushing, Sept. 9. The 7th I thank was kept as a day of Publique Thanksgiving here, as well as it hath been at the Hague, and all other places through the United Provinces for the Peace to coppily concluded with England, nothing beling omitted as to Belle, Bonfires, Fireworks, Fountains of Wine, &c. to express their joy and fathsfaction for the Ending of a Warre which has by its continuance fo ex remely impore-

rifhed the Generality of thele P.ovinces.

Our Merchants are every where fitting up their Sin. Some Veffels will fuddenly go out from the Menfe, and alresdy a Fleet of Fifhery are gone out for herrings. We have at yet no news of our EaR-I dia Fleet; but Van Ghents Squadron will in few dayes put to fea Northwards to strend them, bring already revictualled and refitted.

Plymouth, Sept. 1. The Virginia Fleet chat failed from hence & from Foy, on Fillsy laft, are by contrary Winds put back again Into this Pert, and expect only a fair Gale toen-

courage them to pursue their Voyage.

Portsmouth, Sept. 3. The Tarmouth with 50 fall of Merchanes under her Convoy is Rill in this Road, but bound for London.

Whitehall, Sept. 4. This day the Right Honourable Sir Orlando Bridgman Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England, raving had the usual Oathes Administred to him, took his Place at the Council Board.
