And those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Gentleman who is to present them (not the Lord in Waiting), should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's-Office, BEFORE twelve o'clock on the Monday previous to each Levee, in order that they may be submitted for the King's approbation; *it being His Majesty's command, that no presentation shall hereafter be made at the Levee, but in conformity with the above regulations; and further, that no person shall be admitted, on any pretence whatever, who has not been so presented.*

It is particularly requested, that Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levees will have their names *distinctly* written upon the card to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting, in order that there may be no mistake in announcing them to the King:

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of company coming to Court, until half past one o'clock.
