St. James's-Palace, June 21, 1831.

THIS day His Majesty proceeded in state from St. James's-Palace to the House of Peers, where he arrived about two o'clock; and, having alighted from the state coach, was received at the portico by the Great Officers of State and others, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

His Majesty was there robed, and having put on the imperial crown, the procession moved into the House in the usual order.

His Majesty being seated upon the Throne, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I HAVE availed Myself of the earliest opportunity of resorting to your advice and assistance after the dissolution of the late Parliament.

Having had recourse to that measure, for the purpose of ascertaining the sense of My people on the expediency of a reform in the representation, I have now to recommend that important question to your earliest and most attentive consideration, confident that, in any measures which you may prepare for its adjustment, you will carefully adhere to the acknowledged principles of the Constitution, by which the prerogatives of the Crown, the authority of both Houses of Parliament, and the rights and liberties of the people, are equally secured.

The assurances of a friendly disposition which I continue to receive from all Foreign Powers, encourage the hope that, notwithstanding the civil commotions which have disturbed some parts of Europe, and the contest now existing in Poland, the general peace will be maintained; to the preservation of this blessing My most anxious care will be constantly directed.

The discussions which have taken place on the affairs of Belgium have not yet been brought to a conclusion, but the most complete agreement continues to subsist between the Powers whose Plenipotentiaries have been engaged in the conferences of London.

The principle on which those conferences have been conducted has been that of not interfering with the right of the people of Belgium to regulate their internal affairs, and to establish their Government according to their own views of what may be most conducive to their future welfare and independ-

denee, under the sole condition, sanctioned by the practice of nations and founded on the principles of public law, that, in the exercise of that undoubted right, the security of neighbouring states should not be endangered.

A series of injuries and insults for which, notwithstanding repeated remonstrances, all reparation was withheld, compelled Me, at last, to order a squadron of My fleet to appear before Lisbon, with a peremptory demand of satisfaction. A prompt compliance with that demand prevented the necessity of further measures; but I have to regret, that I have not yet been enabled to re-establish My Diplomatic relations with the Portuguese Government.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered estimates of the expences of the current year to be laid before you, and I rely with confidence on your loyalty and zeal to make adequate provision for the public service, as well as for the farther application of the sums granted by the last Parliament, always keeping in view the necessity of a wise and wholesome economy in every branch of the public expenditure.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

It gives Me great satisfaction to state to you, that the large reduction of taxes which took place in the last and in the present year, with a view to the relief of the labouring classes of the community, has not been attended with a proportionate diminution of the public income. I trust that such additional means as may be required to supply a part of the deficiency occasioned by these reductions may be found, without any material abridgement of the comforts of My people.

To assist the industry, to improve the resources, and to maintain the credit of the country on sound principles, and on a safe and lasting foundation, will be at all times the objects of My solicitude, in the promotion of which I look with confidence to your zealous co-operation,

It is with deep concern that I have to announce to you the continued progress of a formidable disease, to which My attention had been early directed, in the eastern parts of Europe. Information having been more recently received that it had extended its ravages to ports in the Baltic, from whence there is a great commercial intercourse with My dominions, I have directed that all the precautions should be taken, which experience has recommended, as most effectual for guarding against the introduction of so dangerous a malady into this country.

Great distress has unhappily prevailed in some districts, and more particularly in a part of the western counties of Ireland, to relieve which, in the most pressing cases, I have not hesitated to authorise the application of such means as were immediately available for that purpose. But assistance of this nature is necessarily limited in its amount, and can only be temporary in its effect. The possibility, therefore, of introducing any measures which, by assisting the improvement of the natural resources of the country, may tend to prevent the recurrence of such evils, must be a subject of the most anxious interest to Me, and to you of the most grave and cautious consideration.

Local disturbances, unconnected with any political causes, have taken place, both in this part of the United Kingdom and in Ireland. In the county of Clare, and in the adjoining parts of Roscommon and Galway, a system of violence and outrage had for some time been carried on to an alarming extent, for the repression of which the constitutional authority of the law has been vigorously and successfully exerted. By these means the necessity of enacting new laws, to strengthen the Executive Government with further powers, will, I trust, be prevented; to avert such a necessity has been, and ever will be, My most earnest desire; but if it should unfortunately arise, I do not doubt your firm resolution to maintain the peace and order of society, by the adoption of such measures as may be required for their more effectual protection.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS alarming accounts have been received that a malignant and infectious disease has spread and extended itself to parts of the coasts of the Baltic, and to other places; and whereas We feel it to be incumbent upon Us to employ such means as, under the protection and favour of Divine Providence, may be best calculated to guard Our loving subjects against the visitation of so dreadful a calamity, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do herein, by and with the advice of Our said Council, most strictly enjoin and command all Our loving subjects, and more especially those residing at any of the sea-port towns, or in any other places on the coasts of this kingdom,

whether they may themselves be liable to quarantine or otherwise, as they tender the preservation of their own lives, and the safety and welfare of all the inhabitants of this kingdom, most scrupulously to observe all the laws of quarantine which now are or may hereafter be in force, and all Orders made by Us with the advice of Our Privy Council, or by Our Privy Council under the authority thereof, and particularly most carefully to avoid any communication with any ship or vessel, or with any person or persons coming therein from the Baltic, or from any place to which by Our Royal Proclamation, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, or by Our Orders in Council, the laws of quarantine are or may hereafter be extended, or with any boat or person therein coming from or having been on board any such ship, until such ship, vessel, or boat, with the crews and persons on board, and the goods, wares, and merchandize imported therein, shall have performed their quarantine in such places and manner as are or shall hereafter be directed in that behalf, and until they respectively shall have been duly discharged therefrom: and We do further strictly exhort, enjoin, and command all magistrates and persons in authority, and all others Our loving subjects, without loss of time, to give information to Us, through Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, or to Our Privy Council, of any person that they may know or believe to have offended against any of the said laws or orders: and We do hereby warn all persons whom it may concern, that We have given the strictest orders for enforcing with the utmost rigour the most punctual observance of the laws of quarantine, and all the orders, rules, and regulations relating thereto, it being Our firm determination, upon serious consideration of the great extent of misery and calamity which a single instance of improvidently neglecting any of these regulations may bring upon our loving subjects, to cause the severest penalties which the law has provided or may provide to be inflicted upon all those who may be guilty of any offence against the same: and whereas it is also necessary to take the utmost precaution to prevent the spreading of infection, in case the said malignant disease (which God in his mercy avert) should unhappily manifest itself in any part of Our United Kingdom, notwithstanding the precautions taken to guard against the introduction thereof; We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our said Council, to take measures for the establishment of a board of health, to consist of men able, learned, eminent,

and experienced in the study and practice of medicine, together with persons most capable, from their knowledge of the ports of Our kingdom, to afford assistance in the forming of regulations respectively applicable to the local circumstances of the said ports, such board to be authorised and directed to prepare and digest the best rules and regulations for the speedy and effectual adoption of the most approved methods of guarding against the introduction and spreading of infection, and for purifying any ship, or house, or any place, in which any contagious disorder may have manifested itself, and to communicate the same to all magistrates, medical persons, and others of Our loving subjects who may be desirous and may apply to be made acquainted therewith: And We most strictly enjoin and command all magistrates and persons in authority, all medical persons, and others Our loving subjects, especially those within the maritime counties, to give immediate notice to Us, through Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, or Our Privy Council, in case any person or persons should be attacked with any disease attended with new and uncommon symptoms, such as to afford ground for apprehension that such disease is of the same nature as the disorder called Cholera Morbus, prevailing in several parts of Russia, and elsewhere, in order that the most immediate and effectual measures may be taken, as well for affording due and necessary assistance and relief to those afflicted with the same, as for preventing the contagion from spreading amongst Our loving subjects.

HIS Majesty has been pleased to establish a Board of Health, to prepare and digest rules and regulations for the most speedy and effectual mode of guarding against the introduction and spreading of infection, and for purifying any ship or house in case any contagious disorder should unhappily manifest itself in any part of the United Kingdom, notwithstanding the precautions taken to guard against the introduction thereof, and to communicate the same to all magistrates, medical persons, and others, His Majesty's subjects, who may be desirous and may apply to be made acquainted therewith.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 6th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to repeal the several laws relating to the performance of quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that, from and after the first day of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, all vessels, as well His Majesty's ships of war as others, coming from, or having touched at, any place from whence His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, shall have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague, or other infectious disease or distemper, highly dangerous to the health of His Majesty's subjects, may be brought, and all vessels and boats receiving any person, goods, wares, and merchandize, packets, packages, baggage, wearing apparel, books, letters, or any other articles whatsoever, from or out of any vessel so coming from, or having touched at, such infected place as aforesaid, whether such persons, goods, wares, and merchandize, packets, packages, baggage, wearing apparel, books, letters, or other articles, shall have come or been brought in such vessels, or such persons shall have gone, or articles have been put on board the same, either before or after the arrival of such ships or vessels at any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, and whether such vessels were or were not bound to any port or place in the United Kingdom,

or the islands aforesaid; and all persons, goods, wares, and merchandize, packets, packages, baggage, wearing apparel, books, letters, or any other articles whatsoever, on board any vessels so coming from, or having touched at, such infected place as aforesaid, or on board of any such receiving vessels or boats as aforesaid, shall be, and be considered to be, liable to quarantine within the meaning of the said Act; and of any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majesty, His heirs, or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council concerning quarantine, and the prevention of infection, from the time of the departure of such vessels from such infected place as aforesaid, or from the time when such persons, goods, wares, merchandize, packets, packages, baggage, wearing apparel, books, letters, or other articles, shall have been received on board respectively, and that such vessels and boats as aforesaid, and all persons (as well pilots as others) goods, wares, and merchandizes, and other articles as aforesaid, whether coming or brought in such vessels or boats from such infected place as aforesaid, or going or being put on board the same, either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats at any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands aforesaid, and all persons, goods, wares, and merchandize, and other articles as aforesaid, on board such receiving vessel or boat as aforesaid, shall upon their arrival at any such port or place, be obliged to perform quarantine in such place or places, for such time, and in such manner, as shall from time to time be directed by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by His or their Order or Orders in Council, notified by proclamation, or published in the London Gazette, and that until such vessels and boats, persons, goods, wares, and merchandizes, and other articles as aforesaid, shall have respectively performed, and shall be duly discharged from quarantine, no such person, goods, wares, or merchandize, or other articles as aforesaid, or any of them, shall, either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats; at any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands aforesaid, come or be brought on shore, or go or be put on board any other vessel or boat, in order to come or be brought on shore, in any such port or place, although such vessels so coming from such infected place as aforesaid, may not be bound to any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands aforesaid, unless in such manner and in such cases, and by such licence as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, in Council as aforesaid, and that all such vessels and boats, whether coming from such infected place as aforesaid, or being otherwise liable to quarantine as aforesaid, and all persons (as well pilots as others) goods, wares, and merchandize, and other articles as aforesaid, whether coming or brought in such vessels or boats, or going or being put on board the same, either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats at any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands aforesaid, and although such vessels or boats shall not be bound to any port or place in the United Kingdom, or the islands aforesaid, and that all commanders, masters, or other persons having the charge or command of any vessels or boats, whether coming from any infected place, or being otherwise

liable to quarantine as aforesaid, shall be subject to all the provisions, rules, regulations, and restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council as aforesaid, concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection, and to all the pains, penalties, forfeitures, and punishments contained in the said Act for any breach or disobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council made under the authority thereof; and whereas information hath been received that the cholera morbus has lately been making alarming progress in certain provinces of the Russian Empire, His Majesty, under the authority of the said above recited Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby adjudge and declare it probable that the said disease is highly dangerous to the health of His Majesty's subjects, and may be brought into the United Kingdom, or the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, by vessels coming from, or having touched at, certain ports or places of the Continent of Europe, which are hereinafter more particularly described, either with or without clean bills of health; and His Majesty is therefore pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that all vessels coming from, or having touched at, any port or place in Russia, or any port or place in the Baltic, or in the Cattegat Sea, or any port or place on the Elbe, and bound to any port or place in the United Kingdom, or to the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man (having clean bills of health), as well as all vessels, boats, and persons having had communication with such vessels, shall proceed to such of the under-mentioned ports as may be the nearest and most convenient to their port of destination, viz. Cromarty-bay, in the Murray Frith, to the anchorage in the Frith of Tay, near Dundee, in the Frith of Forth, between the North Queen's-ferry and Lord Elgin's Lime-kilns; White Booth-roads, (between Hull and Grimsby); Standgate-creek; the Motherbank, at Portsmouth; Plymouth; Falmouth; Milford-haven; Bromborough (in the river Mersey, near Liverpool); Holyloch, in the Frith of Clyde; and all vessels arriving with foul bills of health, or coming (without bills of health) from any port or place where the cholera is known to prevail, shall proceed either to Cromarty-bay, in the Murray Frith, to Standgate-creek or to Milford-haven, and shall there perform quarantine, and be subject, with their crews, pilots, and all persons having communication with such vessels, to all the rules and regulations established by His late Majesty's Order in Council, of the nineteenth of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five:

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief for the time being of the said isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation of the twenty-third day of April last, establish and declare a scale of rates at which freight should be payable for public and private treasure conveyed on board any of Our ships and vessels, We have, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit further to ordain, declare, and command, and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, that, from and after the first day of September next, the freight for conveying gold and silver in any of Our packets between any two ports, the navigable distance between which shall exceed six hundred leagues, shall be fixed at the rate of one per cent. both for gold and silver: and We do hereby establish and declare, that the responsibility of the officer in charge of such treasure shall commence when it shall be safe alongside the said packet, and shall cease the moment that it shall be landed at the port of destination:

And it is further declared, that in all other respects the said Proclamation of the twenty-third day of April last, and the rules and regulations thereby established, shall continue in full force.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit to order that certain pieces of money should be coined, that is to say, certain pieces of gold money, to be called respectively double sovereigns, sovereigns, and half sovereigns; and certain pieces of silver money, to be called respectively crowns, half crowns, shillings, and sixpences; and certain pieces of copper money, to be called respectively pence, half pence, and farthings; to be of the several values and weights hereinafter particularly described, that is to say, the double sovereigns to be each of the value of forty shillings, and of the weight of ten pennyweights, six grains, and $\frac{2}{3}$ troy weight, of standard gold; and the sovereigns each of the value of twenty shillings, and of the weight of five pennyweights, three grains, and $\frac{1}{4}$ troy weight, of standard gold; and the half sovereigns each of the value of ten shillings, and of the weight of two pennyweights, thirteen grains, $\frac{1}{2}$ troy weight, of standard gold, according to the weight approved of and confirmed by Our Royal Brother, His late Majesty King George the Fourth, in Council, in pursuance of an Act, made in the fourteenth year of the reign of Our Royal Father King George the Third, intituled "An Act for regulating and ascer-

"taining the weight to be made use of in weighing the gold and silver coin of this kingdom:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the fifteenth year of the reign of Our Royal Father, His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the gold and silver coinage of the realm," the Master and Worker of Our Mint in London was empowered to coin silver bullion into silver coins, consisting of crowns, half crowns, shillings, and sixpences, of the standard of eleven ounces and two pennyweights of fine silver and eighteen pennyweights of alloy to the pound troy, and in weight after the rate of sixty-six shillings to the pound troy: and whereas, in virtue of the power so given, a coinage of crowns or five shilling pieces, half crowns or pieces of the value of two shillings and sixpence each, at the rate and of the standard aforesaid, has been made, as well as a coinage of copper pieces, called respectively pence, half pence, and farthings: and whereas We have further ordered that such double sovereigns shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy, with the inscription "Gulielmus III, D. G. Britanniarum Rex F. D." and for the reverse the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield, encircled by the collar of the Order of the Garter, mantled and surmounted by the Royal Crown, with the date of the year, and upon the edge of the piece the words "Decus et Tutamen," and the year of Our reign; and that every such gold sovereign and every such half sovereign so ordered to be coined, shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy, with the same inscription and date, and for the reverse the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield, plain, with the date of the year, and a graining on the edge of the piece; and every such crown has for the obverse and reverse impressions the same effigy, inscriptions, and dates as are hereby ordered for each double sovereign; and every such half crown has for the obverse and reverse impressions the same effigy, inscriptions, dates, and graining as are hereby ordered for each sovereign; and every such shilling has for the obverse impression the same effigy, inscription, and date, and for the reverse the words "one shilling," placed in the centre of the piece, within a wreath, having an olive branch on one side, and an oak branch on the other; and the sixpences have the same obverse and reverse impressions as those upon the shilling, except the word "sixpence," instead of the words "one shilling:" and We have also thought fit to order that each of the said penny pieces, half penny pieces, and farthings shall have the same obverse impression, effigy, inscription, and date, and for the reverse the figure of Britannia: and whereas pieces of money of all the above descriptions have been coined at Our Mint, and will be coined there, in pursuance of orders issued by Us, We have therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command that the said pieces of money so coined, and to be coined, shall be current and lawful money of the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and shall be called by the several names, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of the Kingdom, at the several values here-

inbefore assigned to them, in all payments whatsoever.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that certain ports, therein particularly mentioned, in the island of Jamaica, and in the provinces of Nova Scotia, Canada, and New Brunswick, and in the island of Barbadoes, shall be free warehousing ports for the purposes of the said Act; and it is thereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, to appoint any port in His Majesty's possessions in America to be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act; and that every such port, so appointed by His Majesty, shall be a free warehousing port under the said Act, as if appointed by the same, in as full and ample a manner in all respects as any of the ports thereinbefore mentioned are free warehousing ports appointed by the said Act:

And whereas His Majesty doth deem it expedient, that the port of Road Harbour, in the island of Tortola, should be appointed a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers in him vested in and by the said Act of Parliament, order and appoint, that the said port of Road Harbour, in the island of Tortola, shall be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Viscount Goderich, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
