An Act for improving, repairing, and maintaining the harbours of the burgh of Rothesay, in the county of Bute, and for building and maintaining a gaol, court-house, and offices for the said burgh and county.

An Act for making and maintaining a rail-way from Rutherglen-green to Wellshott, in the county

of Lanark.

An Act for draining and improving certain low lands, situate within the several townships of Norton, Campsall, Askrew, Moss, Fenwick, Little Sneaton, Stubbs Walden, Womersley, Whitley, Baln, Pollington, Snaith, and Cavick and Sykehouse, in the several parishes of Campsall, Womersley, Kellington, Snaith, and Fishlake, all in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for maintaining the road from Wakefield to Austerlands, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for making and repairing certain roads leading across the county of Stirling, and other roads in the said county.

An Act to amend an Act for more effectually repairing and improving the road from Wendover to the town of Buckingham, in the county of Buck-

ingham.

An Act for improving and maintaining the road from the south side of a bridge over the River Colne, called Engine-bridge, in the township of Huddersfield, in the west riding of the county of York, to Woodhead, in the county palatine of Chester, and from thence to a bridge over the River Mersey, called Enterclough-bridge, on the confines of the county of Derby.

An Act for more effectually repairing and improving certain roads leading to and from the town of Cirencester, in the county of Gloucester, and Woot-

And Monsieur Van de Weyer, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Belgians, had his first private audience of His Majesty to deliver his credentials:

To which audiences they were respectively introduced by Lord Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's Guelphic Order.

Queen's-House, St. James's-Palace, August 3, 1831.

This day Monsieur Van de Weyer, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Belgians, had his first private audience of Her Majesty:

To which he was introduced by the Earl Howe, Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

At the Court at St. James's, August 3, 1831.

CEREMONIAL of the Investiture of the Right Honourable Sir Robert Adair, with the Ensigns of a Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

The following Knights Grand Crosses, in their mantles and collars of the Order, assembled at St. James's-Palace, viz. Lord Howden; Lord Hill; Sir John Doyle, Bart.; and the Right Honourable Sir James Kempt; attended by the under-named Officers of the Order, in their mantles, chains, and badges, viz. Sir George Nayler, Knt. Genealogist of the Order; Algernon Greville, Esq. Bath King of Arms; and George-Frederick Beltz, Esq. Gentleman Usher of the Order.

At two o'clock, the Knights Grand Crosses were called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, proceeded into the presence of the Sovereign in the

Throne-room, with the usual reverences.

Then, by His Majesty's command, the Right Honourable Robert Adair was introduced into the Royal Presence, between Sir James Kempt and Sir John Doyle, Bart. the two Junior Knights Grand Crosses present, preceded by Bath King of Arms, bearing the ribband, badge, and star of a Knight Grand Cross upon a crimson velvet cushion, and by the Gentleman Usher of the Order.

The sword of state was thereupon delivered to the Sovereign, and the Right Honourable Robert Adair, kneeling, was knighted therewith, after which he had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand.

Lord Howden having then received from Bath King of Arms the ribband and badge, presented them to the Sovereign, and His Majesty was graciously pleased to put the same over Sir Robert Adair's right shoulder, who, rising, had again the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and, having received from His Majesty the star of the Order, withdrew.

The Knights Grand Crosses were then again called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.
