THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Scal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent

to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for raising the sum of thirteen millions six hundred and sixteen thousand four hundred pounds, by Exchequer Bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act to discontinue or alter the duties of Customs upon coals, slates, cotton, wool, barilla, and wax.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ircland; and to grant allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers, adjutants, paymasters, quartermasters, surgeons, assistant-surgeons, surgeons'-mates, and serjeant-majors of the militia, until the thirtieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two.

An Act to repeal an Act, of the mineteenth year of King George the Third, for repealing so much of several Acts as prohibit the growth and produce of tobacco in Ireland; and to permit the importation of tobacco, of the growth and produce of that kingdom, into Great Britain.

An Act to provide for the better order and government of Ireland, by Lieutenants, for the several counties, counties of cities, and counties of towns, therein.

An Act for granting certain powers to a Company, called "The General Steam Navigation Company."

An Act for extending the royalty of the burgh of Dundee, and for amending the sett or municipal constitution of the said burgh.

An Act to consolidate and amend the several Acts for making the West India Docks.

northerly direction from S. E. 1/2 E. to W.

This light will be known to mariners as a stationary light, from oil, with reflectors; and being elevated 346 feet above the medium level of the sea, it will be seen like a star of the first magnitude, at the distance of from 7 to 8 leagues, and at intermediate distances, according to the state of the weather.
