CEREMONIAL of the Investiture of Admiral Sir Thomas Williams, Admiral Sir William Hargood, Lieutenant-General Sir James-Willoughby Gordon, Bart. and Rear-Admiral Sir Thomas Masterman Hardy, Bart. with the Ensigns of Knights Grand Crosses of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

The following Knights Grand Crosses, in their mantles and collars of the Order, assembled at St. James's-Palace, viz. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland; His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester; Sir James Saumarez, Bart.; Lord Howden; Lord Viscount Beresford; Lord Hill; Sir William Henry Clinton; Sir John Malcolm; Lord Howard of Effingham; the Earl of Rosslyn; the Duke of Gordon; and Lord Farnborough, attended by the undernamed Officers of the Order, in their mantles, chains, and badges, viz. Sir George Nayler, Knt. Genealogist of the Order; Algernon Greville, Esq. Bath King of Arms; Captain Michael Seymour, R. N. Register and Secretary of the Order; and George-Frederick Beltz, Esq. Gentleman Usher of the Order.

At two o'clock, the Knights Grand Crosses were called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, proceeded into the presence of the Sovereign in the Throne-room, with the usual reverences.

Then, by His Majesty's command, Admiral Sir Thomas Williams was introduced into the Royal Presence, between the two Junior Knights Grand Crosses present, preceded by Bath King of Arms, bearing the ribband, badge, and star of a Knight Grand Cross of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion, and by the Gentleman Usher of the Order.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, having thereupon received from Bath King of Arms the ribband and badge, presented them to the Sovereign, and Sir Thomas Williams, kneeling, His Majesty was graciously pleased to put the same over the Admiral's right shoulder; Sir Thomas Williams, rising, had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and having received from His Majesty the star of the Order, withdrew.

Admiral Sir William Hargood, Lieutenant-General Sir James Willoughby Gordon, Bart. and Rear-Admiral Sir Thomas-Masterman Hardy, Bart. were then severally introduced and invested, with the like ceremonies.

The Knights Grand Crosses were then again

called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Commissioners of the Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that a Light-house has been erected upon Dunnethead, in the county of Caithness; the light of which will be exhibited on Saturday the 1st day of October next, and will thereafter continue to be lighted every night, from the going away of day-light in the evening till the return of day-light in the morning.

The following is a Specification of the Position of the Light-House, and the Appearance of the Light, by Mr. Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners:

Dunnethead Light-house is situate on the northern extremity of the mainland of Scotland, in north latitude 58 deg. 42 min., and west longitude 3 deg. 29 min.

the light-house, by compass, bears from the north end of the island of Stroma, in Pentland Frith, W. by N. distant 7½ miles; from Hoy Head, leading to Hoy Sound, S. S. W. distant 13 miles; from the Stack and Skerry, S. by E. 3 E. distant 31 miles; and from Cape Wrath, in Sutherlandshire, E. by S.  $\frac{3}{4}$  S. distant 42 miles In reference to these bearings, the light will be visible to the mariner in a northerly direction from S. E. 1/2 E. to W.

This light will be known to mariners as a stationary light, from oil, with reflectors; and being elevated 346 feet above the medium level of the sea, it will be seen like a star of the first magnitude, at the distance of from 7 to 8 leagues, and at intermediate distances, according to the state of the weather.
