And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** in each of the above cases is hereby offered by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the offender or offenders who caused either of the above fires, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of either of the said offences.—A reward of **FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS** is also offered (with the same exception) by Sir Rowland Hill, Bart.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS** is hereby offered by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and a further reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS** by Mr. Doulan, to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session, for an Act for the better paving, repairing, cleansing, and lighting, widening, and improving the squares, streets, lanes, markets, and places, within the United Parishes of Saint Andrew, Holborn, above the Bars, and Saint George the Martyr, in the county of Middlesex, including Red Lion-square, Dean-street, Fulwood's-rents, and such parts of Holborn and Chancery-lane as lie within the said parishes, and for the removal and future prevention of encroachments, projections, obstructions, nuisances, and annoyances, within the same; and for vesting the sole management and controul thereof in Commissioners or persons to be elected by the vestries of the said parishes respectively, and for power to raise money for the several purposes of such Act by rates or assessments on the proprietors and occupiers of lands, houses, buildings, and other tenements, within the limits of the said Act, or by other means to be provided by such Act; and to repeal the several Acts hereinafter mentioned, or some of them, that is to say, an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of King George the Second, intituled "An Act to enable the present and future proprietors and inhabitants of the houses, in Red Lion-square, in the county of Middlesex, to make a rate on themselves for raising money sufficient to inclose, pave, watch, clean, and adorn the said square;" an Act, passed in the second year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for paving, cleansing, and lighting the squares, streets, and lanes, within the city and liberty of Westminster, the parishes of Saint Giles in the Fields, Saint George the Martyr, Saint George, Bloomsbury, that part of the parish of Saint Andrew's, Holborn, which lies in the county of Middlesex, the several liberties of the Roils and Savoy, and that part of the Duchy of Lancaster which lies in the county of Middlesex, and for preventing annoyances therein, and for other purposes therein mentioned;" an Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George
