**T**HIS day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Common Council, and Officers of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty with the following Address; which was read by Newman Knowlys, Esq. the Recorder; and which His Majesty was graciously pleased to receive on the Throne:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The dutiful and loyal Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London; in Common Council assembled, most humbly approach your Majesty with the warmest sentiments of loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government.

We beg to represent to your Majesty, that we have received, with feelings of the deepest sorrow and dismay, the intelligence of the House of Lords having turned a deaf ear to the nation's voice, by

refusing their sanction to the bill for amending the representation of the people in Parliament, a measure pre-eminently calculated to consolidate the peace, prosperity, and liberties of the people.

We beg further to assure your Majesty, that we entertain unabated confidence in the firmness and patriotism of your Majesty, and in the wisdom and integrity of your Majesty's Government; and we look with intense anxiety for the fulfilment of the noble declaration of your Majesty's Prime Minister, that he will be true to the duties imposed upon him by the confidence of the King and the people, by instantly employing every constitutional means to carry this all-important measure.

We beg, likewise, to assure your Majesty, that we are satisfied the people of England will devote every energy of mind and body to uphold the stability of your Majesty's Throne, and preserve the constitutional institutions of the country; but we are equally convinced, that nothing but the most prompt and energetic measures on the part of your Majesty's Government, to revive the hopes of your people, and give them a certain prospect of the immediate passing of a bill, similar to that which has been rejected, will prevent the most fearful national commotions.

At the same time we beg to assure your Majesty of our continued attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, and of our cordial co-operation in those measures which are so essentially calculated to promote the peace and happiness of your Majesty's people.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

"I receive with satisfaction the expression of your loyalty and attachment to my Person and Go-

vernment, and of your confidence in my Constitutional Advisers.

"You may be assured of my sincere desire to uphold and to improve the securities afforded by the Constitution, for the maintenance of the just rights of my people; and you may rely on my continued disposition to further the adoption of such measures as may seem best calculated for that purpose.

"For the safe and successful accomplishment of such measures, it is above all things necessary, that they should be discussed with calmness and deliberation; and I earnestly recommend to you, to use all the influence you justly possess with your fellow citizens, for the purpose of preserving the public peace from any interruption by acts of violence and commotion."

They were all received very graciously, and had the honour of kissing His Majesty's hand.
