of the Gout at Polidam: That his Electoral Highness has given out Commissions for the raising feveral new Troops, resolving to put himself into a condition to bring an Army of 24000 men into the Field the next Spring, if there be occasion; and that it is the common discourse at that Court that a marriage is treating between the Electoral Prince, and the Princess of Hanouer.

Hamburgh, December 14. There will be a great meeting the next week at Hanouer, of the Princes of Lunenburgh, to confult together upon the prefent juncture of Affairs. The Baron del Val, Envoy from the Marquis de Grana, Governor of the Spanith Netherlands, continues at the Court of the Duke of Zell, without having made, that we hear of, any confiderable progress in his Negotiation.

Hague, Dec. 14. The States of Holland separated the 18 inftant till the 22, when they reaffembled, and the next day adjourned again till after the Holydays, without coming to a refolution concerning the new Levy, which Amsterdam continues to oppofe; and we are told that Delfe and fome other Towns begin to be of the fame opinion. The Heer Heinfins, who has refided fome time at the French Court in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this State, being lately returned hither, has made report to the States General, of his Negotiation concerning the affairs of the Principality of Orange, &c. The Prince of Orange and the Council of State baying drawn up a flate of the Forces for the year enfuing, the fame hath been communicated to the States General, who have ordered Copies to be fent thereof to the feveral Provinces, that they may confent thereunto; which it's believed they will readily do, it being upon the fame foot as is that of this prefent year, without any alteration.

Bruffels, December 2t. The French Troops are marching towards Luxemburg, as is thought, to attack or block up that place. And from Flanders we have an account that between 10 and 12000 French having with them feveral pieces of Cannon, came on Saturday last to Deinfe and Betteghem, bc--tween Gaunt and Courtray, intending, as we believe, to pals the Canal of Bruges, and to attack Damme, or to fall into the Country of Waes, but the fudden breaking of the Frost put a stop to their defign. In the mean time they continue at Deynse and B steghem, and the Marquis de Grana not knowing what they may attempt, has fent all the Officers that were here about their Recruits, to their feveral Garifons, and fom: Dutch Troops are ordered to march towards Flanders to joyn, if there be occasion, our Maistre de Camp General, who is at Gaunt. The Marcichal d' Humieres has caufed a Placaet to be published, whereby he declares, That being informed that feveral Villages within the Spanifh Territories, which are under Contribution, pretend they are not able to pay the fame, for that the most confiderable Inhabitants, to avoid paying their part, are retired with their Goods and Families, he had commanded the Officers employed to raile the faid Contributions, to burn the Houles and Farms which they shall find to abandoned. And that for every House or Village which the Spaniards fhall burn within his most Christian Majesty's Dominions, he will caufe a hundred to be burnt within the Spanish Territories. The French have . put a Garison into Cheney between Namur.a nd Baflogne, and it's believed they will do the like at Huy. We have feveral advices which fay, that 14 Baffas having joyned in a complaint againit the Grand Vifier, the Grand Signior had cauled him to be firangled, and had made *Cupeoli*, his Grand Vifier, but we are unwilling to give credit to this news till it be confirmed.

Paris, December 25. The Spanish Ambassador is preparing for his departure; it's faid he purpoles to leave this place fome time the next week. And we have advice that our Kings Amballador in Spain, is likewife on his return. From Flanders we have an account that the Marefchal d'Humieres having drawn together between 10 and 12000 men, was marched with them towards the Canal of Bruges. and that his Majeflies Troops on the fide of Luxemburg, are marching under the command of the Ma-This day Te Deum was fung at reichal de Crequi. Noltre Dame for the Birth of the Dyke d'Anjou, and in the Evening there was a very fine Firework before the Town-Houle, and the Streets were filled with Bonfices.

Deale, December 16. Yefferday in the Afternoon the Fleet of Dutch Merchant Ships, who were forced into the Downs by foul weather, failed to the Weftward.
