THEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that, late in the evening of Tuesday the 6th day of December instant, the body of a female (since identified to be that of a person named Hannah Hobbs), was discovered at Aldrington, near Brighton, in the county of Sussex, the head being severed from the body, and both arms cut off close to the elbow joints; and that a coroner's inquest having been subsequently held upon the same, a verdict has been returned of "wilful morder against some person or persons unknown;"

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the murder before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person or persons who actually committed or assisted in the perpetration of such murder) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS is hereby offered to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he,

she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.—Such reward to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

Church Commissioners'-Office, No. 13, Great George-Street, December 13, 1831.

THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, making the chapel at Kirkstall, in the parish of Leeds, the church of a district, under the 21st of 58 Geo. 3, c. 45:

At the Court at St. James's, the 19th day of October 1831, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in po-pulous parishes," it is amongst other things en-acted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into. two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe lands, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within eachof such respective divisions; and, if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing in-cumpent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, " that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accom-

modation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England, and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional courches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such districts, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and morel habits of the persons residing therein; the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division: and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for buildpassed in the last session of Famathens, for building, and promoting the building, of churches in populous parishes, and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect: and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that, in the year 1821, when the census was taken, the parish of Leeds, in the county and diocese of York, contained a population of 83,796 persons, which has since considerably increased; that the parish church and chapels afford accommodation for 12,661 persons only; that your Majesty's said Commissioners have caused five new chapels to be erected in the said parish, which will afford accommodation to 5858 persons, including 3497 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that four of such chapels have been consecrated and divine service is regularly performed therein, one of which is called St. Stephen's Church, Kirkstall; that the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that the said parish should be divided into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, that one of the said districts should be assigned to the said new built chapel called St. Stephen's Church, Kirkstall, in the said parish, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving such chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to such chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named the district of St. Stephen's, Kirkstall, with boundaries as follows:

The district is bounded on the south by the township of Armley, leaving the boundary of Armley at the north west corner of the park at Wither, belonging to Joseph Holroyd, Esq. along a rivulet'. leading northward, called Hoffley Gill, to an ancient style called Old Wither, across a field, called Old Wither, and along the west side of a field called the Laith Garth, to a foot and bridle road. called Stump Cross-road, northward to and westward along the ancient highway from Leeds to Bradford, westward to the south east corner of Sanda ford-park, along the south east fence of Sandfordpark to a wood called the Little Fall, including the said wood, to the turnpike road from Leeds to Bradford, along the said road westward to a certain rivulet running from Sandford-park to the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, along the said canal westward to the four rise lock at Brauley Fall, thence to the Kirkstall Forge Ferry, thence along the boundary, of Bramley to the oil-mill, Beek, along the boundary of Horsforth to the oil-mill, Beek-bridge; along the highway leading eastward from Horsforth to Leeds across the Spen-lane-road at the Old Oak; along an ancient foot road leading from thence to Headingley, to the north west corner of the New Grangepark; along the west and south boundary of the said park to a wood called Batcliff wood, including the said wood, to the west side of the estate belonging to Headingley-house, to the highway leading from Kirkstall to Headingley, across the said road down a lane called Leekhouse-lane; along the eastern boundary of two fields called the Intasks, belonging to Barbara Marshall, to the Green-lanefields, the property of Sir Sandford Graham, Bart.; along the eastern fence of the said fields to she north west corner of Burley-hill-fields, the property of William Wilks, Esq.; along the north and east sides of the said field to the estate of Charles Chadwick; along the said estate, on the east, to the ancient highway leading from Kirkstall to Leeds, across the said road to the east corner of the garden belonging to Flower-bank, the property of James Dickenson; from thence, in a direct line southward, across land belonging to the Earl of Cardigan, to the turnpike road leading from Leeds to Bradford, opposite to the entrance of the Burley or Redcote New Bridgeread, across the said turnpike road, and along the said Burley bridge or Redcote-road till it meets the boundary of Armley, as in the annexed plan is particularly delineated:

That the consent of his Grace the Archbishop of York has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and humbly praying that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into His Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to His Majesty shall seem meet:—His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered; that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
