And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** is hereby offered to any person who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.—Such reward to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.
