

# The London Gazette.

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Genova, January 5.

**T**his week arrived here the *Havke* from *Ireland*, having touched at *Legborne*, where she left 50 Sail of English Merchant Ships all employed, and four of other Nations. The Genoese are now again about sending out their great Merchant Ships which are designed for *Sicily* on the Corn Trade. The *Goodwill* is sailed for *Legborne* and *Venice*.

*Dantzicke*, January 1. The Letters from *Warsaw* tell us, that the King of *Poland* was arrived at *Cracow*, where he was received with all the demonstrations of Joy and Affection which that City could express; That his Majesty would make no long stay there, intending to go to *Leopol*, to give the necessary orders concerning the affairs of the *Ukrain*, and then to return to *Warsaw*, where he has appointed a Diet to meet about the middle of *February*. These Letters say farther, that his Majesty purposes to have the next Spring an Army of between 40 and 50000 men in *Hungary*, besides the Troops of *Lithuania*, and the Forces that will be employed to reduce *Caminiec*. From *Leopol* they write, that the Cossacks with whom some Polish Troops were joyned, had invaded the *Little Tartary*, that they had made a very great Desolation in that Country, and were returned with much Spoil.

*Lintz*, January 8. Our Advices from *Hungary*, assure us, that the King of *Poland* is gone home with all his Forces (except those of *Lithuania*, which as we have already told you, have taken their quarters on the *Tibise*) intending to return in the Spring with an Army of 50000 men. The Hungarians fell upon the Poles in their march, to revenge their cutting off the Garrison of *Leuschau*, and did some execution upon them, and the Garrison of *Esperies* sallied out, and fired their Cannon upon them as they passed by that place, and several were killed, and among others Colonel *Premzki*. The Bassa of *Buda*, has it's said, drawn together a Body of 14 or 15000 men, being resolved to attempt the relief of *Newheusel*; and the Imperialists are very watchful on their side to disappoint this or whatever other design he may have. Here is a discourse that the Duke of *Lorraine* will go for *Hungary*, in the place of the Baron *d'Abbe*, to declare to the Nobility of that Kingdom the Emperor's resolutions to grant a general Oblivion for what is past, to restore the Confiscated Estates, and to maintain their Antient Privileges.

*Frankfort*, January 12. From *Municken* they write, that the Elector of *Bavaria* had given orders for the recruiting his Troops, resolving besides, to add two new Companies to each Regiment, whereby his Forces will be increased to 20000 men. From *Ratibonne*, That the Electoral Col-

ledge do with great firmness adhere to their Conclusion. That it is absolutely necessary for the safety of the Empire, to accept of the Terms proposed by *France*, for the establishing a lasting Peace or a Truce between the Empire and that Crown. And from *Lintz*, that Count *Starenberg* was ready to return to *Vienna*, having received a very considerable sum of Money to be employed in the Fortifications of that City.

*Cologne*, January 14. The Bishop of *Strasbourg* is expected here the 16th Instant in his return from *Paris*. The Sieur *Fodoci*, the Imperial Minister, is still at *Bonne*, from whence he has orders, as we are told, to go to *Aix*. Our Letters from *Vienna* inform us, That the King of *Poland*, finding his Troops could not be secure in the quarters assigned them in the *Upper Hungary*, by reason of the continual Incurfions of the Hungarian Rebels and the Turkish Troops which are posted on the Frontiers, had sent them to Winter in *Poland*; That the said Troops, (except those of *Lithuania* which did not joyn the Army till towards the end of the Campaign) were very much weakened; and that now in their march they have been greatly incommoded by the Hungarians, who took all the opportunities they could of falling upon their Rear. The Letters add, that the Bassa of *Buda* has in that place, and the Neighbourhood 20000 men under his orders, with which it's expected he will make some considerable attempt.

*Hamburg*, January 15. Our Letters from *Copenhagen* tell us, that the King of *Denmark* was sending the Heer *Fuel* in the quality of his Ambassador to the King of *Sweden*. That there was a good prospect of an accommodation between his Majesty of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holslein Gottorp*, through the Mediation of the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Princes of *Lunenburg*; And that that King had resolved to raised six new Regiments, and given orders for the dispatching the Commissions. From *Lunenburg* they write, that those Princes are drawing their Troops towards the *Elbe*, to observe the motion of their Neighbours.

*Brussels*, January, 16. We have advice that the French Troops do march again to form two Bodies, the one near *Conde*, the other near *Tournaay*: And that Monsieur *de Montal* is likewise marching on the side of *Charleroy* with the Troops under his command. The Intendant of *Lille* demands very great sums of Money of the Inhabitants of *Mons*, *Audenarde*, and other places, and has let them know, that if they do not forthwith send their Deputies to *Lille* to settle the payment thereof, they must expect to be treated in the same manner that *Luxemburg* lately was. The French continue to demolish the Fortifications of *Courtray*. Count *Salazar*, Lieutenant-General of the Horse in the Service of these Countries, is gone for *Charleroy*, and is to continue there till he receive farther orders from his Excellency. On Wednesday

Wednesday last arrived here an Express from the Marquis de Castell Moncayo, the Spanish Envoy at the Hague, and the Marquis de Grana having thereupon called together the principal Ministers of this Court, to consult with them, the Express was sent back the next day with his Excellency's answer to the Letters he brought.

Hague, January 18. The States of Holland adjourned again on Saturday last for three days, and this evening the Deputies that went home, are expected back to re-semble to-morrow. We do not hear they came to any resolution, before they parted, about the new Levy, but on the contrary are informed that the Towns of Delfe, Leyden, Schiedam, Briel, Alchmaer, and Enchuyjen, have by their Deputies declared, that they cannot consent that any thing should be done in this matter without the concurrence of the City of Amsterdam. Part of Prince Waldeck's Equipage arrived here this morning, and he himself is expected in a few days. From *Hamburg* they assure us that the Alliance between France and Denmark hath been lately renewed, and that the Ratifications thereof are exchanged.

Hague, January 21. The States of Holland re-assembled on Wednesday last, and have been since taken up with very weighty Consultations concerning the present affairs. As for the new Levy there is every day less appearance of their coming to a resolution in it. The great Conference of the Allies appointed to be held here the 20th Instant, is put off for some days. Prince Waldeck and several others that are to assist at it not being as yet arrived. An Express which the French Ambassador dispatched from hence the 12th Instant for Paris, having been set upon near *Maestricht* and robbed of his Letters, as well as of what Money he had, and it being suspected to have been done by some Soldiers of that Garrison, the said Ambassador has complained thereof to the States; but the Governor of *Maestricht* has written to the States to give them an account of the thing, and to acquaint them, that upon strict enquiry he could not find that any of the Soldiers of that Garrison were then abroad.

Amsterdam, January 21. The Letters which we received this morning from *Antwerp*, inform us, that the French Troops taking the opportunity of the Frost, which gave them an easy passage over the Rivers and Canals, were again fallen into *Flanders* and *Brabant*; That they have burnt several Villages in the Country of *Dendermond*; and some in the very Neighbourhood of *Brussels*. From *Liege* they write, that the Duke of *Bouillon* hath declared War against the Crown of *Spain*, and has caused the Estates of the Subjects of that Crown within his Dukedom to be Confiscated. There are Letters from *Vienna* which give an account, that the Imperialists had defeated a Turkish Convoy that was going to *Newbeulet*.

Paris, January 9. It is said at Court that the King will take a journey to *Compiègne* the beginning of the next month, and that the necessary preparations are making for it. From *Flanders* they write, that some French Troops were marching towards *Dendermond* to raise Contributions on that side. A Squadron of Men of War is sitting out at *Tboulon*, and of Gallies at *Marseilles*, and Monsieur du *Quefne* continues in *Provence* to hasten this Equipage. Cardinal *Grimaldi*, Archbishop of *Aix* in *Provence*, is lately dead; by his death the rich Abby of *St. Flouren* in *Anjou* is likewise become

vacant. We had some days since a very warm report of the Popes being very ill, but it appears to have been without any ground. Some of the most Eminent Merchants of this place have sustained a considerable loss by the seizure made within the quarter of the Venetian Ambassador at *Madrid*, which they had an account of by the last Letters from thence.

A Barbarous Murder having been committed on the 26th of December last past at *Hirfal*, the Earl of Humes House in *Barwick-shire*, in the Kingdom of Scotland, by Mr. *William Hume*, youngest Brother to the said Earl, upon the Person of *Joseph Johnston* of *Hilton*, and he having thereupon fled into England; He is aged about 26 years, of a tall stature, slender of Body, fair of Complexion, his face somewhat freckled, his Eyes of a light Grey near to Blew, his Hair Red, but ordinarily wears a light coloured Perriwig. Whoever shall give notice of him, so as he may be put into the hands of Justice, to the Widow of the said *Joseph Johnston* at *Huton Hall* in the said Shire, or to Major *George Winram* at Mr. *Everards* House in *Angle Court* near *Charing Cross Westminster*, shall have 50 pounds Sterling as a reward, and their Charges born.

Richard Cox of *Daginton* in *Oxfordshire*, who went by the name of *Richard Hunt*, a pretty big clubbed Man, black Face, of indifferent habit, sometimes with a brownish Frock, a Scotch in his Face, a pair of Leather Cocks, being lately apprehended and committed to *Worcester Gaol*, has confessed he had three Companions. One young Black man curled Hair, fat face, a new grey Riding Coat, a Stuff Goat under, and short Boots, a new whitish Hat, goes by the name of *William Gray* of *Kankham*, alias, *William Staire*, alias, *Wert* and *Dry*. One young fair man with yellow Hair and a light coloured Wig, a whitish coloured Coat, a Doe skin pair of Breeches, a Leather Girdle, goes by the name of *William Stookes*. One old man going stooping in the Shoulders, a black Wig, a black Hat, indifferent habit, Pockholes in his Face, his Teeth worn low and black, aged near 60, goes by the name of *Richard Alton*, alias, *Johnston*. These four men have brought several Horses, Mares, and Geldings into the Counties of *Oxen* and *Warwick*, which were suspected to be stolen, and have sold them thereabouts to several persons; If any Man have lost any, he may repair to *Richard Colegrove* of *Sibford* near *Banbury* in the County of *Oxon*, and may be farther informed.
