We do fervently pray that He, by whom Kings reign, may continue to overshadow and bless your Majesty with many and happy days, and to prosper all your designs for the good, honour, and safety of these dominions, so that peace and happiness, under the will and paternal sway of the House of Brunswick, may be established and prolonged even unto the ends of the world.
