HE Polish Envoy is still here, having been very well received at this Court; as to his demand of Succors, he has been answered in general rerms, and affored of this Kings readiness to contribute what lies in him to the happy Success of the War the Crown of Poland is now engaged in. The faid Envoy goes from hence to Denmark; He is making Preparations for his journey; And has been prelented by the King to the value of 2000 Crowns. His Majesty intends to take a Progress Northwards; which it's faid he will b gin the 15th of the next Month, he will visit the most considerable Places, and see the Copper Mines, but his chief design is to take a review of his Troops in those parts

Genous, Fanuary z. The last week Don Emanuel Coloma, the Spanish Resident, had an Audience of the Senate, to whom he communicated the refe lution the King his Master hath thought fit to take, of declaring War against the Crown of France. The Master of a small Vessel arrived here from the Coast of Barbary, reports that two Algerine Men of War were returned home with a French and a Spanish Prize; That they have sill eight Men of War abroad, and that those people continue resolute not to make a Peace with the French. From Thoulon we have advice, that a Squadron of Men of War is fitting out there against Spring, and that it will be commanded by Monseur du Quesne, being designed, as is faid, against the Algerifes. They write from Turin, that 1000 French Soldiers were arrived at Ca-

Venice, fanuary 8. On Wednesslay last parted from hence the Procurator Landi, being fent by this Schate to the Pope, to Negotiate some affairs of importance. The Prince of Saxony, Nephew to the Elector of that name, arrived here the last week; and the Duke of Mantua is expected the next, to partake of the divertisements of the Carnaval. Our Letters from Rome tell us, that the Pope had received the news of the King of Spains having declared War against France, with some trouble, his great design and endeavour being to compose the differences between these Crowns, as well as between the Empire and his Most Christian Majesty, that so there may be nothing to divert a vigorous profecution of the War against the Turks. These Letters farther tellus, that the Pope does very zealoufly labour to maintain a perfict Union and good Correspondence between the Emperor and the King of Poland; and that he has lattly written to them to exhort them to make the use they ought of the great Successes it has h pleased God to give unto their Arms, for the benefit of themselves and the com-mon Interests of Christendom. Postdam, Fanuary 2. The Sicut de Groot, who is here in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Hamouer hath had I veral Co f rences with the Ministers of our Elector: It is believed that the chief Subject of his Negotiation is the Marriage of the Electoral Prince with the Prince's of Hanouer, which many look upon as good as con-cluded. The Count de Lamberg the Imperial Micluded. nister is suddenly expected at this Court! In the mean time our Elector has, as we are informed; written a Letter to the Emperor, wherein he re-presents to his Imperial Majesty, the reasons that do induce his Electoral Highness to be of opinion, that nothing is more to be defited for the fafety and prefervation of the Empire, than the Establishment of a firm Peace with the Grown of France, and that the conditions propoled by his most Chriwe have an account that the Morlaques continue! . told that feveral of the other Electors have made the like representation to his Imperial Majesty. There is à discourse that a Conference will, be suddealy held at Hamburg between the Ministers of the King of Denmark, the El. ttor of Brandenburg and the Princes of Lunenburg, but the occasion is not said. This week parted from hence the Baron Dorfling Mareschal de Camp General of his Electoral Highnestes Troops, to take a review of them in the most considerable places of this Country,

Copenhagen, Fanuary 1. The King of Denmark has given out Commissions for the raising five Regiments of Horse; and we are told that there will be likewise a new Levy of Foot. The beginning of the last week arrived here an Express from Paris, who, it's faid, brought his most Christian Majesties Ratifications of the Treaty of Alliance now renewed between the two Crowns. There is a discourse that our King intends to take a Journey for Holstein the next month, or the beginning of March; before which time it's hoped the Treaty of Accommodation between his Majesty and the Duke of Holstein Gotterp will be concluded through the Interpolition of the Princes that do interess themselves therein. The Sieur Cojet Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden, is gone to pass the Holidays at a House he has in Schonen. It is faid that his most Christian Majesty will send hither a Squadron of

Men of War in the Spring.

The Levies that are making in Vienna, Fan. 9. the Hereditary Countries for the recruiting the Imperial Regiments, advance with good success, and according to all appearance the Officers will have compleated them by the time limited. Prince of Savoy passed some days agone through this place in his way to Hungary to visit his Regiment, lately commanded by the Count de Kuffstein which is quartered at Newfol. The Count de Scherffenberg and the Baron Diependall, who commanded the Imperial Troops that lately took Leusschau, are arrived here from Hungary, and after some days stay in this place, will continue their journey for Lintz. The news we had of the Poles having made themselves Masters of the Town and Castle of Zeben, is confirmed; They took it by affault, and in their first fury putall they met with to the Sword. The Count de Humani and Count Bargotzi, having obtained the Emperor's Pardon, are come in with their Troops, and have undertaken to observe the Forces of Count Teckeley, and to himder their pailing the Tibifque. The Letters from Gran fay, that some persons came thither from the Turkish Territories, reported that the Grand Visier continued at Belgrade, having sent Officers into all the Provinces-of the Octoman Empire to raile Men, and to make other provision for the And from Newfol they write that the Turks at Newheusel are in great, want of Provisions, and that their Parties were frequently abroad to see what they could get from the Country people.

Francfort, Fanuary 15. The Prince of Lubomirski is by this time arrived at Lines to receive his Commission, as well as Money, for the raising a Regiment of Cuireffiers; and it's believed he will be advanced to some Eminent Command in the Emper T's Army for the good Services he performed during the last Campagne. Our Letters from Hungary tell us, that Count Feekeley hath not been able to accomplish the design be had (and wherein t so licited the Turks to joyn with him) of fal-

ling upon the Imperialists in their Winter-quarters; and that after having passed to and fro among the Turks, he was returned with 600 men to a firong Castle in Hungary on the other side of the Tibifque, having the displicature to see his Party become every day weaker by the defertion of those that have been the chief support of it. From Rasifbonne they write, that the Electoral Colledge had communicated to the Count de Creey, the French Minister there, their last Conclusion, by which they declare their adherence to their former refolutions for the excepting the Conditions proposed by his Most Christian Majesty to establish a firm Peace or a Truce between the Empire and that Crown.

Strabourg, Fanuary 11. The 5th Instant the Count d'Alteyms Envoy from the Emperor to the most Christian King, passed through this place in his return home. The seventh arrived here Prince his return home. Louis of Baden, accompanied with several Persons of Quality, who came to the Fair that's now kept here; Our Governor the Marquis de Chamilty went with two Coaches with fix Horses, and several led Horses to meet him, and at his entrance into the Town, he was faluted with the Cannon of the Fort of Kieland the Cittadel. Here hath been great rejoycing for the Birth of the Duke d'Anjon.

Hague, Fanuary 23. The Polith Resident here hath given the Prince of Orange an account of the King of Poland's return to Cracow, and of his having left the greatest part of his Forces to Winter in Hungary. The Heer Van Hairen Ambassador from this State to the King of Sweden, will now very fud-

denly begin his Journey.

Wells, Fasuary 19. On Monday last was brought hither the new Charter which His Majesty hath been Graciously pleased to Grant unto this Cor-poration.
