Cologne, January 28. Levies are making here for the Service of the Emperor, the King of Denmark, and other Princes. The Bishop of Strasburg returned hither the 16th Instant from the Court of France.

Hamburg, January 18. From Copenhagen they write, that the King of Denmark was sending an Ambassador to Sweden. That his Majesty intended to have a very good Fleet at Sea the next Summer; And that he hath given out Commissions for the raising six new Regiments of Horse.

Some Deal men have tried to go off to her in one of our Yauls, but could not get through the Ice, so were forced to come back. The Sea is Frozen for above a mile about the Shore. The like was never known here.

Trinity-House, January 26. The Master, Wardens, and Assistants of the Trinity House, do desire all persons concerned to take notice, That the Buoys in the South Channel, are either gone or out of place; And it's very probable that the Buoys in the North Channel are in the like condition, and that care will be taken so soon as possible, to have them all renewed and recovered. In the mean time all Masters of Ships, and others concerned, are desired to take notice, that they may avoid running themselves and Ships into danger.
